MARRIAGE STATISTICS.—A summary of the 478 marriages solemnized in this Province last year, according to the report of the Registrar General, shows that where bride and bridegroom were of the same denomination, the classification was as follows: Roman Catholic, 161; Presbyterian, 95; Methodist, 48; Episcopalian, 14; Baptist, 3; other denominations, 7. There were thus 138 marriages in regard to which the bride and groom were of different religious denominations. It is interesting to note how these figures relate to the different counties. In Queen's there were 57 marriages in the P. C. Church, 29 in the Presbyterian, 26 in the Methodist, 7 in the Baptist, 6 in the Episcopalian, 2 in the Christian, and one in regard to other denominations. In Prince the Catholic marriages were 65; Presbyterian, 25; Methodist, 20; Episcopalian, 11; Baptist, 3; Christian, 1; other denominations, 1. In King's, there were 39 Catholic marriages, 14 Presbyterian, 2 Methodist and 1 Baptist. In respect of marriages where the contracting parties were not of the same religious persuasion, 71 were performed in Queen's, 51 in Prince and 16 in King's.
