RECORD FLIGHT IN MONOPLANE

LONDON, Feb. 25.—A new and notable record of three hours and five minutes for a flight in a monoplane from Paris to London was made by the well known French aviator, Marcel G. Brindejonc Des Moulinais, today. The aviator started at 8.15 this morning from Paris, landed at Calais at 10.50 resumed his flight at noon and descended in London at 1.30 after crossing the Channel in a fog. The distance between Paris and London is 287 miles so that, during his actual flying time of 185 minutes the French aviator flew at more than a mile and a half a minute.

P. E. I. DAIRY ASSOCIATION

The annual convention of the Prince Edward Island Dairymen's Association opened yesterday forenoon in P. W. College, and was continued in the afternoon and evening. The report of the Secretary showed that in the past year 25,201,885 lbs. of milk for cheese were supplied. Out of this 2,424,626 lbs. of cheese were manufactured—netting 2,930 farmers \$258,495.17. As to butter 12,200,944 lbs. of milk produced 327,494 lbs. of butter netting 910 farmers the sum of \$119,028.39. As compared with last year there was a falling off in the cheese manufactured amounting to about \$2,000 and a gain in butter amounting to about \$6,000. Inspector F. T. Morrow's report was a carefully prepared statement with reference to the condition of the factories throughout the province, and 1912.
