The adjourned preliminary hearing of the case of the King vs. William W. Molyneux, charged with the murder of his wife, formerly Ada Jenkins of this city, will come up again this morning in Georgetown before Stipendiary Reddin. A good deal of interest centred in this case on its opening last week; the first day the court room was filled with interested ones. On the second day interest seemed to wane, notwithstanding the fact that little Harry Molyneux's evidence was expected to bring out some startling developments. In the hearing today or tomorrow the most important testimony to be adduced will be the expert evidence of the doctors, which is expected to have a decided bearing on the case. It will, in all probability take two or three days to conclude the hearing.

Martin of that picturesque and prosperous part of the province was called to the chair and in a brief and excellent speech referred to the object of the occasion and then introduced the lecturer. M. McDonald and supported by W. E. McPherson. All these gentlemen referred to the enjoyment of those present, ably reviewed the lecture and related some apt anecdotes illustrative of the subject, the chairman who had so admirably discharged his duties, then in a few well chosen remarks conveyed this expression of the audience's appreciation to the lecturer and the meeting closed by all joining in singing the National Anthem. The proceeds were in aid of the Orange Association.

The death of a minister well known in this province, especially in Masonic circles, is chronicled in a Halifax exchange of yesterday as follows: The death of Rev. H. D. Deblais occurred at his home here early this morning, after a brief illness, aged about seventy-nine years. The Rev. gentleman had a fall over a year ago from which he sustained severe injuries and since that time has been in failing health. Deceased was a native of Halifax and came to Annapolis many years ago to take the principalship of the high school in this town, in which capacity he served with marked ability. He was afterwards appointed rector of the Anglican church at Grandville Ferry, also at Round Hill, and at St. Stephen. He was also prominent in Masonic circles and was high up in the degrees of the order. He served for a term as master of the grand lodge of Nova Scotia and in other offices of the institution and had the honorable distinction of being appointed permanent chaplain of the grand lodge up to the time of his demise. He also served as high priest of the grand chartr of Royal Arch Masons of Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland. He also served as grand worthy patron of the order of the Sons of Temperance of this province and will long be remembered for his efforts in disseminating temperance principles. His first wife, who was a Miss Spurr, predeceased him a number of years and he subsequently married a Miss McLaughlin, of Lunenburg, who survives, and one daughter Mrs. Charles McCormick, and two sons, William and Fred Deblais, who are living abroad.
