**PROVINCIAL BANK OF CANADA**

**FORTY FIFTH ANNUAL MEETING**

Increase in Assets and Deposits  
Liquidity 88 per-cent

The General Manager Reviews the Annual Statement, President's Address

The forty fifth annual meeting of shareholders of the Provincial Bank was held at the Head Office in Montreal, on the 10th January 1946. The General Manager, Mr. J. U. Boyer, first submitted an analysis of the statements which showed a profit of \$476,520, compared with \$464,907 in the previous year. From these profits, deductions for Federal taxes were \$148,123 and for amortisation of bank premises \$88,437. Dividends to shareholders at the rate of five per cent absorbed a further \$200,000.

After making these deductions there remained a sum of \$228,960, which was carried forward to Profit and Loss Account, which stands at \$270,245. Total assets which increased by \$21,000,000 now amount to a figure of \$132,909,222. Quick assets consisting of cash items, deposits with the Bank of Montreal and other banks, amount to \$20,416,010. Investments totalling \$82,494,583 included \$78,226,000 of Provincial Government bonds, all maturing by the end of the year, but still of short term, amounting to \$38,521,653. Canadian municipal securities stand at \$9,649,799, and other bonds debentures and stocks total \$1,618,114. The total assets of the bank are equal to eighty eight per cent of the liabilities to the public against eighty seven per cent last year.

Mr. Boyer went on to say that towards the end of the year there was an increased demand for currency loans, which stood at \$16,432,219 which is an increase of \$1,300,000 over 1944. Loans to municipalities stood at \$14,600,000 and deposits bearing interest of \$5,500,000 over 1944 and the deposits bearing interest of \$85,000,000 over 1944. We made donations to the various seasonal funds in answer to appeals; also to the Red Cross and to other war aids. We also paid an instalment on the Books of Knowledge for the School and we also made a donation to the school library.

Our social functions consisted of sending of cards of sympathy to the bereaved families of our district, three brides and were new-comer. We also sent cigarettes to a number of servicemen overseas.

Lastly may I again thank you, officers, for your good work and may we go forth together, as we have done before, with the same enthusiasm to our new duties as members of a Women's Institute.
