The June term of the Supreme Court opened yesterday at Summerside with only one case, an appeal, on the docket. The traditional pair of white gloves indicating that there were no criminal cases on the docket were presented to the presiding judge, Mr. Justice Mark R. McGuigan by Sheriff Hubert Hall.

In addressing the Grand Jurors, Mr. Justice McGuigan said that the statute which gives to the Grand Jury the duty of appointing constables and fence-viewers is out of date and the appointments should be made in some other manner. "Some fence-viewers may be necessary," he said, "but I have grave doubts whether constables are." He suggested that the Attorney-General bring the matter to the attention of the Legislature. Another reason he gave for these appointments being made in some other manner was that when there are no indictments before the Court the Grand Jury could be dispensed with for that sitting.

In opening his remarks he said that serving on the Grand Jury is an honor and a duty of citizenship. That there were no criminal indictments before the court spoke well for the law abiding character of the people, he said. The Grand Jurors were: W. A. Currie, Summerside, foreman; Earle Corney, Summerside; William G. Phillips, Arlington; Frank L. MacNutt, Darnley; Preston Kennedy, Kensington; Walter Newcombe, Port Hill; Harry Simmons, Summerside; Lloyd Burns, Freetown; Scott Cairns, Freetown; Horace Glover, Kensington.

The only case on the docket was the King (appellant) vs. Bruce McKay and Co. Ltd. (respondent) an appeal by the Crown from the sentence of \$10 and costs imposed in a rentals conviction. The case was adjourned till July 6th for hearing.

On motion Mr. W. E. Darby, K. C., Mr. Alan Nicholson, director of family allowances, was made a commissioner for taking affidavits. Following is the report of the Grand Jury.

"We have inspected the court house premises and have found them in good general repair, but would strongly recommend that a plumber be engaged to effect immediate repair to the toilet on the 2nd floor. It is leaking badly and causing damage to the floor, also first storey walls. We recommend that the central heating plant be examined by a competent plumber and any necessary repairs be promptly attended to; and the supplementary heating unit now at the rear of the building be installed provided it is found to be in good condition. We also recommend that an outside hose tap be installed at the entrance to the north side. The electric range in the jailer's quarters had a burned out element and we recommend repair. We suggest that new furniture be acquired for the prothonotary's office. In regard to law enforcement, we recommend that our provincial law controlling the speed of motorcars and trucks be rigidly enforced. We endorse the recommendation of a previous Grand Jury to the effect that automobile insurance be made compulsory in this Province. We have checked the lists of fence-viewers and constables, striking out the names of two deceased and adding the name of one new constable. "Respectfully submitted, W. A. Currie, foreman of Grand Jury for self and others."-S.

Seek Disallowance Of Trade Union Act

OTTAWA, June 1 (CP) - A joint delegation representing the Canadian Congress of Labor and the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada will petition Justice Minister Isley tomorrow for disallowance of Prince Edward Island's Trade Union Act, it was learned today. The unusual joint action by the two major labor bodies in Canada is in protest against the restrictive labor legislation passed by the P.E. Island Legislature last March 15. Under the legislation, unions on the Island may not be a part of a national or international union. A.R. Mosher, President of the C.C.L. and Percy Bengough, T.L.C. President, will head the delegation, scheduled to meet Mr. Isley at 5 p.m. A.D.T. tomorrow.

Australian Doctors Boycott Free Medicine

SYDNEY, Australia, June 1 (CP) - Doctors throughout Australia are boycotting the Federal Government's free medicine scheme which officially came into force today. Reports from the state capitals said the public was unable to get free medicine either privately or at hospitals. Druggists are agreeable to co-operate with the Government but they are unable to make up prescriptions free unless the doctors use forms specially issued by the Government for the purpose.

Under the scheme—if it works—the Federal Government pays for all medicine made up from a formula of 800 drugs. The doctors must prescribe on the Government form in duplicate. Then the prescriptions are handed to an approved druggist who makes up the medicine and receives payment from the Government.

The doctors claim their main objection to co-operating lies in the formula which limits them to using 800 drugs from which to prescribe and to the Government's insistence that all prescriptions must be written on the Government forms. They claim this places a doctor's practice under Government control.
