INVENTION FOR USE IN FOGS.

LONDON, Sept. 2.—A successful demonstration has been made in Liverpool of an invention for the use of ships, particularly in time of fog.

The apparatus, which is the invention of two brothers named Hcd-kinson, consists of a drum to receive the sound waves and an indicator. The drum, which measures nine feet by five feet, is placed aloft where it cannot be affected by sounds on deck and is connected electrically with an indicator, which is placed in such a position that it can readily be seen by the ship's officer on duty.

By means of the electrical device a sound wave from a particular direction causes an electric lamp in a particular position in the indicator to be lighted.

If the other vessel is moving, different lamps are lighted in succession showing the vessel's course.
