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Oliver was arraigned before Magistrate Huesla in East Saint John police court a little more than 12 hours after a coroner's jury named Oliver as figuring in the soldier's death.

The preliminary hearing will open in the East Saint John police court Tuesday morning, Jan. 6, at 10.30 o'clock.

The man who now faces a charge of murder is a former officer of the Salvation Army, according to Mrs. Oliver.

Born in Alberton, P.E.I., he entered a Salvation Army officers' training college and served as a captain for some time in the United States, she said.

Later he returned to Alberton married—that was 14 years ago—and moved with his family to Saint John in 1930, obtaining employment with a lumber firm with whom he worked for six years, until the plant was destroyed by fire.

From then until he secured his present job as night watchman, he had worked at the dry dock, on road construction, as a guard and in connection with the erection of soldiers' huts at the K-Club Grounds.

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
