140TH BATTALION ST. JOHN, INSPECTED

Major General Sir Sam Hughes during his visit in St. John last Tuesday inspected the three battalions there, the 140th, Col. Fowler, M. P., the 115th Col. Wedderburn, and the 140th, Col. Beer. The last named was presented with band instruments which had been publicly subscribed through the instrumentality of the local Branch of the Daughters of the Empire. After its inspection, the 115th took up a position at the north side of the field in order to allow the 140th to form up for the purpose of viewing the presentation of instruments which was made by the Minister of Militia on behalf of the Daughters of the Empire. Mrs. Travers then read the address which accompanied the presentation in which she made reference to the pleasure and honour it gave the I. O. D. E. to make such a gift to the 140th Battalion. Mrs. Travers made reference to the gentlemanly way the men of the 140th had conducted themselves while in St. John, closing with the following words: "May God bless you, and I sincerely hope that you will return playing up on these instruments the march of victory."

Major General Sir Sam Hughes in making the presentation said in part: "It gives me great pleasure to present these instruments to Col. Beer for the battalion band. I selected Col. Beer to command the 140th Battalion on account of his sterling qualities as a man and a soldier."

Col. Beer made a fitting reply thanking the I. O. D. E. for their kind gift and also the Minister of Militia for the words of confidence he placed in the 140th Battalion. Closing his reply Col. Beer said: "I fully realize the advantage of having music at the front, and knowing my experience I can assure you that such a gift is very much appreciated."
