At the opening of Charlottetown's new Library Building and Harris Memorial Art Gallery yesterday afternoon a tribute was paid to the works, the memory and the life of the late Robert Harris, famous Canadian artist, in honour of whom, and through whose generosity and beneficence the edifice is now existent.

Historic libraries were referred to by Premier Saunders who presided at the opening, the financial and economic phases of the institution by His Honour Lieutenant-Governor Hearsh, who formally declared the library open, the life of Robert Harris and the educational value of the library by Rev. Canon Morris, the edifice as a fitting memorial for a great man by His Worship Mayor Yeo, some personal reminiscences of the public benefactor by Mr. Justice Hazard, and the educational possibilities in art and literature by Mr. Justice Arsenault.

Premier Saunders gave an historical sketch of libraries of the past, referring to the books of ancient civilizations. During the middle ages libraries were established in the monasteries by the monks, notably in Spain where a library of 250,000 volumes was erected.
