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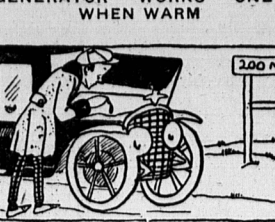

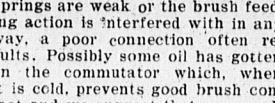
BY ALBERT L. CLOUGH GENERATOR WORKS WHEN WARM ONLY



A. K. R. writes: My generator will not deliver charging current, regularly, until it is warmed up and, when the engine cools down, it again gives trouble. Putting a few drops of kerosene on the commutator will cause it to generate regularly for a few hundred miles, when the trouble reappears. Can you tell me what is wrong?

Answer: This seems to be a matter of imperfect brush contact. Are you sure that the brushes are of good material? Some cheap ones on the market do not make reliable connection. Is the brush pressure sufficient? If the brush-holder springs are weak or the brush feeding action is interfered with in any way, a poor connection is often results. Possibly some oil has gotten on the commutator which, when it is cold, prevents good brush contact and we suggest that you sandpaper the commutator and also the ends of the brushes to remove any glazed over surface that may have formed upon them and to shape them exactly to the commutator surface. It may be that kerosene thin an oil film on the commutator and permits brush contact.

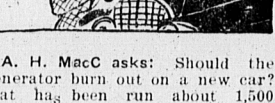
GENERATOR BURNOUT IN EARLY SERVICE



A. H. MacC asks: Should the generator burn out on a new car? It has been run about 1,500 miles? Can a wire be applied from the generator to the engine to prevent such an accident?

Answer: It should not, but if it has been run for a considerable period, without the battery charging, a burn out of the field windings might occur at any time, assuming the generator to be one that depends for its regulation upon the battery lead. If, through failure of lubrication, the armature bearings wear out, so that the windings touch the pole pieces, an armature burn-out might occur at any mileage. Assuming that neither of these things happened, we should suspect that such an early burnout of your generator was due to initial defects in the generator. Connecting the main wire of the generator to the engine, should prevent a field burnout in generators of the type referred to above.

CAUSES OF GENERATOR BURN-OUTS



A. H. MacC asks: What causes a generator to burn out and how can this be prevented? If one notices that the battery is not charging, what is the cause? The generator so that the car can safely be driven to a garage?

Answer: Anything that short-circuits the armature windings may do so, for instance copper dust between the commutator leads or a breakdown of the insulation between armature coils or between the armature windings and the core. These accidents cause heavy side currents to flow in the windings heat them excessively, destroy the insulation and render the armature useless. The excessive heat from the engine tends to ruin the generator insulation in time. A generator field winding may be burned out by the battery having become disconnected. This throws so much current through the field wire that it overheats and its insulation falls. If the battery becomes disconnected, electrically connecting the main generator wire to the engine frame, should protect the field windings.

USE OF GRAPHITE GREASE

J.W. asks: Is it a good idea to use graphite grease in filling the cups on the ends of the springs?

Answer: Many consider it is, on the theory that graphite not only adds to the lubricating value of the grease, but also on the ground that if lubrication is neglected and the surfaces become dry, the graphite left upon them will prevent serious cutting and wear for some time.

Salary Increases For St. John Teachers

ST. JOHN, N. B., Feb. 10.—Salary increases to the amount of \$35,142 for the teachers, janitors and officials of the schools were passed by the board of school trustees at the regular meeting last night.

The advisability of making such a wholesale increase in salaries was questioned by some members of the board. Dr. Bridges said that within the last few years more than 2,000 school teachers had left this province and located in Alberta and Saskatchewan. If a slight increase in salary would make them more contented here, it was money well spent. Mr. Nagle said that the average increase was not more than \$100 a year and that was a moderate figure in the salary adjustments of commercial houses.

NOSKE WARNS THE GERMAN PEOPLE

BERLIN, Feb. 8.—"Preserve all your dignity," the statement issued by Minister of Defense Noske, with regard to the demands of the Allies at extradition of Germans desired for war crimes.

"As great as is the excitement of the population on account of the Entente Government's extradition demands," says Herr Noske, "the expectation must be expressed that the requisite dignity will be preserved by everyone and that all molestation of member of foreign missions and of military commissions be refrained from so that I may not be obliged to make more drastic protective measures."

The Zeitung Am Mitag says that Admiral Oscar Von Igenhoff, former commander of the German High Seas Fleet, who is demanded by Great Britain, and Capt. Von Der Planitz, formerly aide de camp to the German Crown Prince, who is wanted by Belgium, both are dead. (Von Der Planitz is reported to have been killed in battle in October, 1915.)

The Admiralty yesterday was overworked by callers answering to names such as "Mr. Mueller," who clamored to know whether they were on the extradition list of the Allies.

TRIALS IN NEUTRAL COUNTRY BEFORE NEUTRAL JUDGES

BERLIN, Feb. 9.—While refusing unequivocally to hand over to the allies the men named as guilty of war crimes the German Government is expected to make a compromise proposed to have the neutral judges, with both German and allied representatives participating in the court proceedings.

In Government circles Switzerland is hinted as agreeable as the site of the trial.

After being closeted with Chancellor Bauer for more than four hours Dr. Mayer, d'Auffrais at Paris, was expected to leave for Paris on a night train with instructions to receive and transmit the official list and note which are expected to reach Berlin on Saturday, before when no definite action can be taken here.

The chief burgomaster of Cassel Herr Scheidemann, who is chairman of the Foreign Affairs Committee of the National Assembly arrived in Berlin today. At once he called the committee together while the party leaders are conferring about fixing a date for convening the National Assembly, which probably will meet at the middle or end of next week.

The crisis, according to reports expected to reach its climax for at least two weeks. The allies' note will be carefully examined for possible loopholes affording the possibility of negotiations or a compromise. Germany's first answer will first be submitted to the Foreign Affairs Committee of the National Assembly for approval, so as to lend greater weight.

Compromise Counter Proposal Whether the note leaves a loophole or not, this first answer is expected to contain a compromise counter proposal as well as an elaborate final plea regarding the impossibility of fulfilling the surrender terms of the treaty.

Meanwhile protest demonstrations are beginning. The Prussian Parliament held a protest session this afternoon and passed a resolution unanimously save for the Independent Socialists. Official correspondence of the German National Party has gone on record declaring that no member of the party may lift a hand to help to hand over Germans to the Allies. The Prussian League passed a resolution protesting against any surrender and expressing the expectation that the Government will resist with all means at its command.

The following comment of the Socialist organ Vorwaerts is significant because it is inspiring and reflects the Government's present temper.
