Temperatures For Storage.

Extract from Report of Commissioner of Agriculture.

The following is a list of the temperatures at which it seems desirable to hold the different products in their best conditions.

Product	Degrees Fabr.
Butter (for long periods)	20
Cheese (for long periods)	36
Tender fruits, such as early apples, pears, peaches, tomatoes (for long periods)	38 to 34
Dressed beef, mutton, pork and poultry	32 to 30
Eggs	36 to 34

In order to secure the best results from the use of cold storage in warehouses and on board the steamships, it is necessary that the goods be handled in the best possible way when they are removed from the cold storage chamber. During warm weather, the packages should be left unopened for about two days, until the products become gradually warmed up to near the temperature of the surrounding air. If that be not done the cold surface of the products will cause the moisture out of the warm air to be condensed on them. In the case of eggs, fruits and meats, particularly, that will cause them to have an appearance called "sweating" and to become rather unsightly. The packages should be left closed for at least two days, in a room where the temperature is the same as that of the air in which they are to be handled afterwards. Otherwise, moisture from the air will be condensed on the surface of the products and give them a most undesirable appearance. The so-called "sweating" of eggs is not an exudation of moisture from the shells of the eggs, but is entirely a condensation of moisture from the air. That applies also to meats which are covered by cloths. The covering should not be removed from the quarters until they have been hung for a short time at the temperature of the atmosphere at which it is to be put up. A difficulty in the carrying of meats in cold storage has been experienced from their liability to become mouldy on the surface when they were removed from the cold storage room and left in a room at a warm temperature. Experiments are being carried on at the present time to find if such development of mould cannot be prevented in a simple way, which will also improve the appearance of the meat and in no way affect it injuriously.

The Filipinos.

One of the vital elements of the situation is the attitude of the Philippine people. It would require a bloody civil war to subject them again, if that ever could be done, to the horrors of the religion of the religious fraternities, in whose hands the entire Spanish power was as clay. It is inconceivable that American arms, or the arms of any other foreign power would be used to reduce the Filipinos in their former intolerable servitude.

It seems to us that at Manila, and in America, that the attitude of the Filipinos is very generally misapprehended. It would almost appear as though the efforts of the Filipinos to erect a constitutional government among themselves were in some obscure way a derogation from American authority. Wherever that view is held, the question is quite misunderstood. The nearer the Filipinos have come to the creation of sound domestic administration, the more fully is the American intervention on their behalf justified, and the more definite appears the claim of the Filipinos to the protection of the American people.

During the hostilities at Manila it is true that the attitude of the insurgents under Aguinaldo was open to construction. But what is the situation? They fear above all things the restoration of Spanish authority through the lenience of the American commission. In fact, they deny the claim of any such commission to dispose of their lives and liberties. They hold that America must not sell them again into bondage. That is what the dread, and until they are assured of this their only course is to maintain an observant attitude, always gratefully ready to acknowledge the protectorate of America and, with that the control of all foreign affairs by the American government as the essential condition of the protectorate. They far being deserted by those whom they look upon as their saviors, and they resent, as who would not, the very possibility of having their freedom again bartered away in a conference to which they are not admitted as a consulting party.
