The regular monthly meeting of the School Board was held last evening at 7.30. The teachers' reports showed the enrolment for the past month to be 1223—average attendance 1011—the percentage of attendance 90—number of cases of tardiness 230—truant 8—visits to parents 210—notes 29—corporal punishment 10—below average in grading 37—requests to leave school before closing 68. On account of damage done to school property in Prince St. School the Board was obliged to forbid the use of the grounds as playing ground after school hours. Permission was given the teachers of Queen Square School to have a school garden. The schools will close for midsummer holidays on Thursday, the 28th inst., and re-open on Tuesday, the 3rd of September. The closing exercises will be conducted as last year in the Market Hall. The Secretary was directed to call for tenders for coal, and the re-arranging of West Kent St. School. The committee on property reported that school gardens were started in connection with the Prince St. and West Kent St. Schools. After passing some bills the meeting adjourned.

**WELLMAN EXHIBITS ARCTIC BALLOON**

PARIS, June 9.—A private view was given yesterday by Walter Wellman's dirigible balloon, America, which is to be used in his Polar expedition. It was found that both motors and the envelope are nearing completion. Owing to its great dimensions it is impossible to inflate the airship in Paris where there is no sufficiently capacious shed. The crew will consist of five men—Wellman, Hersey, Gaston Hervey, the aeronaut, T. J. Smith, the wireless telegraph expert, and Paul Colindale, the engineer. The arrangements for housing the crew are limited. Only two men will be able to sleep at the same time. Mr. Wellman hopes to be able to leave Paris for Norway about June 10.
