## AT THE BOYS.

Quebec Telegraph: The pernicious habit of treating the returned invalided soldiers should be frowned down by all right thinking people, especially the young men of this city. It is all very well to feel proud of the deeds of our brave boys in South Africa, but there should be other ready means of expressing that pleasure than by the "treating" process, which is so common nowadays and which seems to be the only means at one's disposal to show our friendship and gratitude for their good work. While there may be no harm in taking a drink or two, there is a time when a halt should be called; otherwise people may commence to think that because one happens to wear the uniform it is a passport for drunkenness. That fortunately is not the case, as there is less of the drinking habit in the army to-day than has ever been before. Besides all the parents of the boys would not thank their young friends for filling them with whisky as a means of welcoming them home again, but rather would appreciate their tendering advice that could not but serve a good purpose for their future welfare.

The London License Trade News, an organ of the British license victuallers, joins in the appeal to the public not to "stand treat" to "our returned invalided soldiers, the treat taking the form of alcoholic liquors" as follows:  
"As a matter of fact, poor Tommy Atkins returned from the war debilitated, physically unfit either from wounds or fever, is about the last person in the world who ought to have alcohol, and the very first, therefore, to go under when he is served with it. We ourselves, on a journey, saw the terrible effects of an even limited supply of beer (they had only three 'bitters') on some of the poor fellows who were travelling from the north to the midlands. The physical and moral degradation of intoxication seems intensified in the person of the young fellow, who, having shown a willingness to do and die if needs be for Queen and country, a magnificent resolution, has not the strength of mind or power of body to resist the influence of drink, or refuse the cruelly kind attention of the thoughtless. We hope that every license-holder, out of the love he bears the young soldier, will do his best to save him from danger and disgrace of drunkenness."

## LIPTON'S PORK PROFITS.

NEW YORK, Oct. 22.—Big men in the pork market say that Sir Thomas Lipton will easily pay for his new Shamrock, now building for a second try to "lift the America's cup," out of the profits of his pork deal. His corner in the pig market, they say, bids fair to be so successful as to make some of his American competitors pay for the new yacht, and maybe for a third one if his coming trial is unsuccessful.  
It is said the shorts sold at least 75,000 barrels of winter packed pork. Assuming that Sir Thomas brought off this amount—and it is believed his purchases are much greater—his profits already in sight are \$300,000.  
Old speculators say pork will go much higher, and that Sir Thomas will clean up \$10 profit a barrel. In that case his total gain will be near \$750,000.

## GRAVE OF LIEUT. ROBERTS.

A Dutchman's Graceful Offer to Deceased's Parents

PIETERMARITBURG, October, 23.—A loyal Dutchman, named Hattling, residing near Frere has made a graceful offer to Lord and Lady Roberts.  
The remains of their son, Lieutenant Roberts who fell at Colenso lie in this man's farm and he offers to make over to the parents of the deceased officer two acres of land around the grave.  
Hattling is one of the very few Natal Dutch who refused to join the enemy when they appeared in their neighborhood.

## WRECK OF THE MAINE

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 22, 1900. Gen. Wood Governor-General of Cuba, saw Secretary Long to-day and recommended that steps be taken to remove the wreck of the battleship Maine from Havana harbor as it occupies a great deal of space which could be utilized to advantage. He said he thought the wreck would have to be taken up piecemeal.
