### IN MEMORIAM

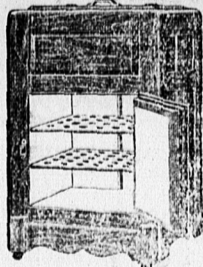
In loving memory of our dear mother, Mrs. Patrick Donnelly, who departed this life May 23rd, 1922.

## DISCUSSION ON ESTIMATES CONTINUED IN LEGISLATURE

Discussion Continued on Items of Agricultural Department, Coroners' Inquests, Executive Council and Education.

PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE  
April 26.  
House in committee on estimates. Mr. D. C. McDonald in the Chair.  
Falconwood Hospital and Infirmary (\$102,200.)

MR. STEWART: Notwithstanding the promise of my hon. friend the Premier, to have this expenditure reduced he is still keeping it up. It has gone to \$118,000 under this Government. What about those pre-election promises?

MR. HIGGS: It is \$16,000 less than 1919, despite the increase of 25 per cent. to the attendants.

MR. STEWART: What I am criticizing is your failure to carry out your pre-election promises. If you intended to raise the salaries why did you not tell the people that, rather than put it into your platform that you were going to decrease expenses?

MR. HIGGS said that personally he had made no such promise. He was not responsible for what other men might promise.

MR. STEWART: The Premier is not responsible for what his followers say, and my hon. friend is not responsible for what the Premier says, yet they make it a party platform, and my hon. friend runs his election on that.

MR. STEWART: In 1919 the expenditure was \$118,000. MR. STEWART: But you had your finger in that. You had better take any other year of Conservative rule. You are very careful to choose the year that you meddled with yourself.

MR. DEWAR: The year before last \$20,000 was paid out and last year it was reduced to \$100,000. I am informed that the officials of the institution informed the trustees they did not think all that expenditure actually took place. \$27,000 for coal was out of all reason. The item carried.

Interest (\$59,300.)  
MR. STEWART: I would like to ask is it the expectation of this Government that this vote will cover the interest for the year?

MR. DEWAR: Yes.  
MR. STEWART: How do you figure it out? After borrowing \$175,000 last year and adding that to the debt?

MR. DEWAR: The money borrowed for roads and the ordinary debt should not be confused. The interest on the money borrowed is paid out of auto license receipts. The ordinary interest is paid out of ordinary revenue. There is a diminution in the matter of the ordinary interest.

MR. STEWART: Since when? MR. DEWAR: Since the last year or two. Of course, there was an increase of interest when this Government took office, when this \$5,000 or \$6,000 power of some \$186,000 of an overdraft.

MR. STEWART: Your own and Mr. DeWara's borrowed road money as part of the bonded debt you have earmarked the auto fees for this purpose, and you say that we are confusing the issue by telling the people the truth about it. There are two items which have always been bracketed together, "Due Bank" and "Due on Loans." These two items total \$521,000 after deducting the Victoria Bonds last year. The Government in funding the auto receipts have simply taken from one pocket and put into another. They have borrowed on short term loans to pay off the indebtedness.

MR. STEWART: The short term loan is simply some \$42,000 carried forward.  
MR. STEWART: Will you explain what is meant by "due loans"?

MR. DEWAR: I cannot say. MR. STEWART: Does he know anything about the Public Accounts?

MR. STEWART: It was not borrowed by this Government at all. MR. STEWART: Here we have in 1919, according to the audit taken, "due loans" \$140,418. That same item last year was \$358,000 more. Will you tell me how that increase came about? Was it for the highways increase?

MR. DEWAR: It might have been. MR. STEWART: It might have been? What was it for?

MR. DEWAR: It might have been bonds. MR. STEWART: It might have been anything. If you sell bonds and pay the money into the bank you will increase the interest at the bank. That is beautiful financing.

MR. STEWART: The bonds may be due in the course of three or four months. It might be considered favorable to sell these bonds and convert them into cash and deposit them in the bank for the purpose of preventing the bank interest from accumulating.

MR. LEPAGE: You passed a Tax Act in 1919 on the farmers.

MR. STEWART: That is not correct. It was on property holders.

MR. KENNEDY: We did not pass any Tax Act. My hon. friend knows all about that. He has been working himself into this now for some time. It is well worth his while for him to do some talking.

MR. STEWART: I believe that you are going to make a personal collection, and I would ask you not to do so. I don't want any private quarrels.

MR. KENNEDY: If he interferes again he will take his medicine. Continuing, Mr. Kennedy charged the Government with boasting of a "Pay as you go" policy and at the same time mortgaging the province for \$450,000. They had gone behind over \$300,000 besides that, according to the records. They are now intending to increase this debt. Any reasonable person can see that the increased indebtedness proves the increased indebtedness.

At the time the last Government went out the elections were held in July. The Conservatives were entitled to three or four months in order to prepare the financial statement of the province.

MR. STEWART, during Mr. Kennedy's remarks, rose on a point of order to suggest that there was not a quorum, that the hour was late and there would be nothing gained by remaining all night. The Estimates could not be rushed through in this manner. The Government had wasted plenty of time in caucus and had kept the Opposition members waiting on several occasions.

HON. MR. LEA, who at this stage of the proceedings was in the promoter's chair, began to speak. Mr. Kennedy said he had not finished, and asked if the Commissioner were speaking on a point of order.

THE CHAIRMAN said Mr. Lea had the floor.

MR. KENNEDY said he had given a place to Mr. Stewart on a point of order. Did the Commissioner think he was through? He had only started!

MR. STEWART: I merely rose to suggest that we have no quorum and that it would be proper to adjourn.

HON. MR. NASH said the suggestion was an excellent one.

HON. MR. LEA: I have the floor. MR. KENNEDY: Do you speak on a point of order?

THE CHAIRMAN: You should not have given the floor to the Leader of the Opposition.

MR. STEWART: If did not take the floor, I rose on a point of order.
