Trust Companies In The Maritimes

Trust Company Growth in the Maritime Provinces was the subject of the address before the Rotary Club yesterday by Mr. Clarence N. Bissett of the Eastern Trust Company of this city. Mr. Bissett enumerated the various phases of trust company work including corporate trust, sinking funds, transfers, real estate, mortgages, guaranteed investments, agencies, safety deposits, bankruptcies, etc. The number of companies in the Maritimes is double what it was ten years ago. One trust company alone with its head office and the greater portion of its business within the Maritimes has total assets of over ten millions in excess of the combined total assets under administration by all Dominion licensed trust companies operating throughout Canada in 1914. At the end of 1929 the Eastern Trust Company with head office at Halifax had under administration estates, trusts and agencies amounting to \$44,590,000 and its total assets amounted to \$48,600,000. This was the first trust company in the Maritimes established under Dominion charter in the year 1893. The first in Canada was established in Toronto in 1882, Nova Scotia being the second province in Canada to have a trust company.

BOARD URGES YEAR ROUND AIR SERVICE

The following letter has been forwarded to the Postmaster General from the Charlottetown Board of Trade: April 24th, 1930. Hon. P. J. Veniot, Postmaster General, Ottawa, Ont. Dear Mr. Veniot: At the close of another winter season the Charlottetown Board of Trade wishes to express again its appreciation of the very excellent Air Mail service which your Department has provided for Prince Edward Island. Since Confederation Prince Edward Island has by reason of its insular position been continuously handicapped in matters of transportation. Very great improvement has been registered in recent years, but the advent of the aeroplane has served to emphasize the great delays still consequent upon the rail service and ferry crossing to and from this Province. After arrival of the Maritime Express from Montreal at Moncton at 10.10 a.m. daily, the mails for Prince Edward Island there assembled from all Canadian provinces except Nova Scotia, and practically all the rest of the world cannot be delivered by railway service in Charlottetown until 6.30 p.m. - a lapse of eight hours and twenty minutes. Throughout the winter they have been delivered with great regularity by aeroplanes before noon. Correspondence can, under this Air Service, be attended to by business houses during the afternoon, and replies can go forward the following morning. Whereas by rail service no mail from outside the Province reaches Charlottetown until after all business houses have closed for the day. The mails assembled at Moncton on Sunday morning cannot be delivered in Charlottetown by rail until Monday evening after an elapsed time of thirty-two hours and twenty minutes. Mails arriving in Charlottetown by rail at 6.30 in the evening cannot be forwarded to any points south of Charlottetown until the following afternoon; whereas if they came to Charlottetown by aeroplane at noon they would go to all points south of Charlottetown, and most points east 4 Sherman Boulter.

Located to the rear of this section are the Chevrolet 6's, selling in the range of 4's. Last year the company discontinued the manufacture of 4's and built 6's exclusively. The 1930 model is an improvement over its predecessor in many ways, being equipped with special built shock absorbers, non-glare glass, and the famous Fisher body. Four beautifully built, and beautifully finished sedans represented the Marmon for which T. G. Ives is representative. In order were the Marmon Roosevelt, Marmon Model 69, the Marmon Model 79, and the Marmon Big 8. Notable features of these machines are the progressive combustion system brought about by a double dome head, balanced crankshafts without counterbalances, composite bodies, and exceptionally easy riding qualities due to special spring material. The Marmon is the only straight 8 in existence. All are radio equipped. The Durans also sold by the same agency, have fine representatives in the 6-14 Show Chassis, the only Show Chassis in the building, the Sport De Lux Sedan '6-14, the Sport Roadster, the 6-14 Special Sedan, and the new model 407 Four Cylinder Sedan, the only one of its kind in Eastern Canada.
