German Untrustworthiness Again Revealed

AMERICAN HEADQUARTERS IN GERMANY. Jan. 16.—Nearly two hundred three inch field guns, several thousand shells and more than one million dollars worth of harness and equipment, not surrendered by the Germans under the armistice terms, were discovered in an isolated work house near Coblenz today. The Americans immediately seized the whole store.

Canadian Delegates Are Now in Paris

(Special to The Guardian.)

LONDON, Jan. 16.—The remainder of the Canadian peace congress dele-gates will join Sir Robert Borden in Paris tomorrow, except Labor repre-sentative P. M. Draper who awaits the result of the Trades Union Con-ference of Britain, Canada and the United States. The majority of the Canadian delegates expect to return to Canada at the end of February for the Parliamentary session and it is quite probable the Prime Minister will be back early in March.

PARIS, Jan. 16.—The Supreme Coun-cil of the Peace Congress has decid-ed that hereafter all information con-cerning the proceedings will be res-tricted to an official communication prepared jointly by the Secretaries of the Delegations of the five Great Pow-ers. The delegates will not comment or give any information except what contained in the official statement.

LONDON, Jan. 16.—According to the official statement given out today by the Governments taking part in the preliminary peace conversations the meeting adopted the following two general principals: One, each delegation being a unit the individual members shall have no influence upon its status at the conference; Two, in the selection of its delegation each nation may avail itself of the panel system; this will enable each state at discretion to entrust its interests to such persons as it may designate. The adoption of the panel system will in particular enable the British Em-pire to admit among its five dele-gatees representatives of the Dominions, including Newfoundland, which has no separate representation, and of India.

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Sir William Peterson Suffered a Paralytic Stroke

MONTREAL, Jan. 16.—In the pres-ence of many prominent citizens and a large audience assembled in Emman-uel Church to hear Harry Lauder Sir William Peterson, principal of McGill University, who was presiding at the meeting, was stricken with a paralytic seizure, as a result of which it was necessary to convey him at once to Royal Victoria Hospital. Sir William complained of feeling unwell, and the Rev. Geo. Adam tried to per-suade him from attending the meeting but he insisted and was helped to the platform by the pastor. It was during the singing of a quartette that atten-tion was called to Sir William's con-dition. He was at once attended by Dr. Armstrong and other medical men in the audience and was found to be suffering from a stroke which affected his entire right side and it was fur-ther stated that there was hemorrh-age on the brain.

Sir William was conscious to-night but his speech is affected. He is under the care of Dr. W. R. Hamilton, Dr. F. G. Finley and Dr. Duncan Mac-Callum, who issued the following bul-letin at ten to-night.

"Sir William Peterson has suffered a severe apoplectic stroke, but is rest-ing quietly."
