penditure WELL WITHIN THE REVENUE, I may say TO THE EXTENT OF SOME \$40,000. Instead of a deficit we have A SURPLUS OF THAT AMOUNT AND INDEPENDENT OF THAT, A SMALLER SURPLUS OF BETWEEN THREE AND FOUR THOUSAND DOLLARS. Moreover we will be able to reduce the public debt to the extent of \$20,000 Now that sounded quite big and if Mr. Arsenault had not stopped him, ten chances to one he would have expanded it still more. But what says the public accounts?

From the first to the last page there isn't the vestige or sign of a figure, either real or imaginary, to show a solitary dollar of that boasted \$40,000 surplus. The statement was and it appeared to have been most deliberately manufactured out of whole cloth, with out even grounds upon which to give it an imaginary foundation. As to the reduction of the public debt, there was not a dollar of debt reduction due to their efforts or management of the finances during the year. Apart from the "Sinking Fund" established by law many years ago, WHICH WAS A FIXED AND BINDING OBLIGATION ON THIS AND ALL GOV-

ERNMENTS amounting to \$19,359,12, set aside by this government, AS ALSO BY THEIR PREDECESSORS, there was not one dollar of a reduction in the public debt shown upon the face of their accounts. This shows the amount of credence to be placed in the statements of the Premier of the province. And even his addition of "smaller surplus of between three and four thousand", the only one of his stated items that does appear in the accounts, is only a fiction, for on another page there are admitted unpaid bills sufficient to offset it.

But, as is the custom with these account jugglers, most important facts and information are withheld from the public or presented as to mislead the unwary. How many unrepresented accounts or bills for moneys due on account of last year's business have been held back, is known only to the chief cooks of the provincial accounts. The auditor does not know and cannot know until they are produced to him by the department having the transactions in hand and consequently cannot include them in the entries of his
