Stocks Suffer Setback On New York Mart

NEW YORK, Jan. 22.—Stocks suffered their sharpest release for more than a month in Saturday's market as renewed apprehension over European affairs touched off selling in virtually all departments. While a few issues managed to emerge with modest gains, losses of 1 to 4 points were widely distributed among leaders. Extreme setbacks were reduced, though, in some cases near the finish. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was off a full point at 50.9, the largest drop for any single session since Nov. 18. On the week the composite showed a net decline of 4 of a point. It was the third consecutive weekly down turn of this barometer. Prominent on the slide were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Chrysler, Motors, U. S. Rubber, Montgomery Ward, Douglas Aircraft, Westinghouse, Allied Chemical, Du Pont, Kennecott, American Telephone, Consolidated Edison and Texas Corp. In the Canadian section most shares drifted lower. Losses of major fractions appeared in Canadian Pacific, Canadian National, Walkers and Distillers. Filing of a court plea for a receivership for the Baltimore and Ohio by an individual bondholder helped dent this stock 3-4 of a point at 61-2.

WINNIPEG, Jan. 22.—(CP)—Wheat futures moved narrowly in dull trading on the Winnipeg market Saturday as weakness in securities was offset by forecasts of cold weather in the United States winter wheat belt. At the close quotations were unchanged to 1-8 cent lower, with May at 62 3-4, July 63 and Oct. 63 1-4 cents. No export sales of Canadian wheat were confirmed. Liverpool finished 1-4 lower to unchanged. Chicago futures traded within narrow range and closed practically unchanged while Buenos Aires remained unchanged. Cash wheat trade continued to centre on the low grades of feed wheat. Friday's late sales were estimated around 250,000 bushels most of which was sold from stocks in Georgian Bay ports to Eastern mills. Pit-trade in coarse grains was featureless. 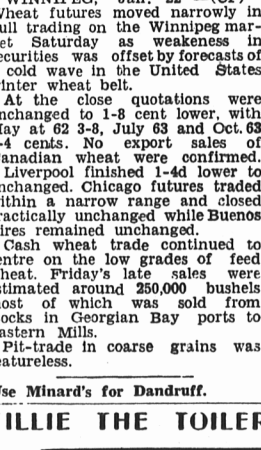

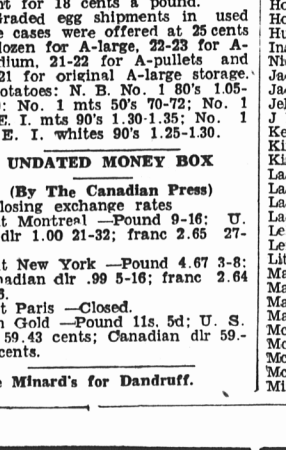
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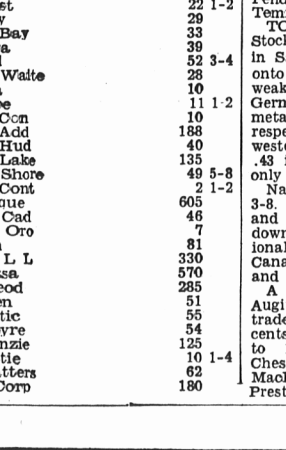
