LAMP RAYS LIKE DAYLIGHT
 Nearer natural illumination than any light ever produced, rays from a new gas-electric lamp can be produced more cheaply than electric light. The inventor, Prof. Georges Claude, one of the world's foremost physicists, says that the new form of illumination gives a cold light that has no effect on color, whereas color effects change under lights now in use. The illumination is produced by passing an electric current through a mixture of rare gases in a tube, says Popular Mechanics Magazine. Invention of the cold light closely follows Professor Claude's production of the neon-gas light, now widely used for advertising purposes.
