HAMILTON, Bermuda, April 1. - (Correspondence N. Y. Herald).-Here is an enchanted isle where it is always afternoon. Winter forget it, they say, and certainly dull care never heard of it. Out in the thickets of oleandertrills the "Don't Worry Bird." Here nobody bothers about anything except to fill the day to the brim with doing what he pleases. The hotels take care of the practical side of life, the tourist gives himself to following his bent.

Considering all things in the workaday world, which is a few hours steaming distant, it is well with the season on this isle of summer. The fact that Bermuda is under martial law need annoy none, for it has an added fascination of mystery, and also army and navy give bright accents to the balls at the hotels and the dances at private houses. The modern dance has reached every nook of the world, and it is a sight worth a forty-eight-hour trip to behold the young subalterns of His Majesty's service in the rites of the one step and the hesitation. The army moves with more of the serene glide, the navy has much more of the roll of the sea on its one step, and its arms continually go up and down, pump handle fashion.

There are always two or three cruisers or battleships at the dockyard or in the offing, and at times the streets are thronged with the walking evidences of shore liberty. The garrison also furnished its quota to the social life and, taken all in all, it is not at all bad to have martial law spread over this glittering atoll. And now the spirit of Great Britain pervades the colony of Bermuda! You may see, if you will, the great posters in the Colonial Office proclaiming that the nation is at war with Teuton, Austrian and Turk ending up with the phrase, "God Save the King." In all that goes forward there is the sign of manual devotion to the power beyond the seas. You will see it when the Government gives out the prizes for the tennis tournament; when it attends the affairs for the benefit of the sufferers from war; when he goes to every public affair.
