SOLIEL URGES A DISSOLUTION

An Article by the Quebec Organ of Sir Wilfrid

Pass Railway Act First, it Says Then go to the Country to Ask the People's Ratification.

QUEBEC, July 26.—In an article urging dissolution on the Grand Trunk Pacific scheme of the Government, Le Soliel, Sir Wilfrid Laurier's Quebec organ, says: "Let us go before the people, and that right after the session of parliament."

"Le Soliel is certain to be the faithful echo of all the Quebec Liberals in asking the federal government to proceed with its railway policy without delay. In our opinion any delay in order to secure friends or peace and harmony in the party would be condemned by the majority of the Liberals."

"Let the Government go ahead bravely and have parliament ratify the measure in the interest of the people. If the Conservatives continue to protest and pretend that they represent public opinion, we advise the Government to dissolve Parliament immediately after the session and appeal to the people."

"It is true that the present Parliament will not expire for two years yet, but the Liberal party should follow its old traditions and not wait till forgetfulness and a commencement of the work of construction render in efficacious the intervention of the people. If we are beaten, we will not have the railway, and the Liberal party will have lost two years of power, but the honor of the party will be safe."

"Sir Wilfrid, the district of Quebec, which gives you this advice through Le Soliel, is ready for the fray."

JAPAN SEEKING CHINA'S ALLIANCE

To Better Resist Aggression from Western Powers

Russian Church Trying to Abate Hatred of Jews—Preparing for the Papal Conclave—Cardinals Deliberate.

TO ALLAY RUSSIAN HATRED OF JEWS. ST. PETERSBURG, July 27.—(Special)—By order of the chief Procurator of the Holy Synod the Bishop of Kishineff has instructed the clergy of his diocese to exert their influence on members of the Orthodox Church by sermons and personal admonition to allay anti-Semitic religious hatred.

JAPAN COURTING CHINESE ALLIANCE. PEKIN, July 27.—(Special)—Japan, since the Chinese war of 1894-5 has been devoting every effort to advance her influence with the Chinese Government the belief being that the ultimate object is to form an alliance to better resist the aggressions of the western powers.

JAPS EDUCATING CHINESE CHILDREN. Japan in seeking to effect the reorganization of China's army is securing the attendance of many Chinese children at Tokio University and other schools of country.

PREPARING FOR THE CONCLAVE. ROME, July 27.—(Special)—The Vatican is a hive of industry while preparations are going on apace for the conclave.

THE TEMPORAL POWER AGAIN. The Cardinals today discussed the advisability of sending a note to the powers regarding the condition of the Holy See, protesting against the occupation of the pontifical territory by Italy.

NO ACTION WAS TAKEN. It was said however that such a note would not add any force to the many protests already made, while it might interfere with the policy which the future Pope may desire to follow. No decision was arrived at.

BLACK FRIDAY ON WALL STREET.

The Suspension of two Important Firms

On New York Stock Exchange, J. R. Keene Interested as one of Members of Broken Firms Was Brother-in-law.

NEW YORK, July 24.—The announcement on the stock exchange for the suspension of the firms of Talbot Taylor and Company and W. L. Stow and Company was the sequel to a period of excited selling of stocks and wide cuts in prices which have not been equalled before since the present movement to liquidate set in.

There is nothing in either failure that can be traced to business or industrial conditions outside of the exchange, the case lying close to a diagnosis of speculation collapse. Both firms have been largely concerned in the speculative stock market pools formed for the purpose of taking on a line of stocks, sustaining their price by supporting orders, real or manipulative, and seeking to realize profits by selling out to outsiders at the high prices. Such operations have suffered from increasing difficulties with the growth of the stringency of money, the solicitude of bankers over loans employed in such projects, and the jaded appetite of the public for securities. The failure of Talbot Taylor and Company will evidently be connected with operations of Keene and Company by reason of his family connection with and frequent employment of the firm.

WAS A BLACK FRIDAY. It was a veritable Black Friday, and although the market rallied decidedly at the close, a great many persons who had interests in the street went home in anything but a cheerful frame of mind. It was freely predicted that trouble even more serious was impending. From trustworthy sources it was learned that three or more commission houses had been squeezed almost to the bursting point. Contracts made today hold over till Monday, which may enable embarrassed individuals to get their second wind.

To those who were in the "know" the Stow failure caused little surprise, but the Taylor embarrassment was really unexpected. Talbot J. Taylor is just James R. Keene's son-in-law. His brother, James B. Taylor, and Foxhall P. Keene, son of James R. constitute the firm. The effect of the Taylor failure upon James R. Keene's personal fortune is largely a matter of conjecture.

The firm of W. L. Stow and Company (W. L. Collidge) was organized in 1899, and has been known almost ever since as the stock market representatives of the Mexican Central railroad. "The firm's manipulation of Mexican securities was frequently a matter of general gossip."

ROYAL PARTY NOW IN ULSTER

Receive Most Enthusiastic Greetings from People

Belfast Decorated—Fifty Addresses Presented, King Edward's Pleading Speech—Fatal Railway Accident in Glasgow.

SERIOUS RAILWAY ACCIDENT. LONDON, July 27.—(Special).—Thirteen persons were killed and a score injured in a railway accident at Glasgow where an excursion train from the Isle of Man crashed into the buffers at the station. Two cars telescoped. Among the killed are one whole family.

LOYAL ENTHUSIASM IN BELFAST. BELFAST, July 27.—(Special)—The welcome extend to King Edward and Queen Alexandra at the capital of Ulster which marked by the same enthusiasm which has followed their progress through Ireland.

ULSTER'S CAPITAL EN FETE. The city is elaborately decorated and thronged with sight-seers. Ten thousand troops, 20,000 blue jackets and 5,000 police lined the streets. FIFTY ADDRESSES PRESENTED. The Lord Mayor and Corporation awaited Their Majesties at the railroad station and presented them with an address. Upwards of fifty other addresses were presented on the same occasion.
