C.A.H.A. And N. H. L. Sign New Accord

TORONTO, Aug. 14 (CP)—A working agreement between the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association and the National Hockey League, similar to one in effect last year but making provision against "raids" by United States and English clubs, was in force tonight.

THE NEW AGREEMENT WAS REACHED

at a conference here Saturday between C. A. H. A. and N. H. L. officials. It holds the rift caused year ago when the amateur hockey organization declined to continue its agreement with the N. H. L. which had been in effect for several years.

BOTH BODIES WILL USE THE SAME PLAYING RULES

"Both bodies will recognize each other's suspensions. The N. H. L. agrees not to take junior players from C. A. H. A. clubs without the latter's consent."

THE N. H. L. AGREES NOT TO SIGN

players from any C. A. H. A. club during competition. The C. A. H. A. agrees not to allow its players to be on the reserve, negotiation and try-out lists of the N. H. L. to be transferred outside the boundaries of Canada."

IN A FORMAL STATEMENT ISSUED

after the conference, the C. A. H. A. committee said: "The N. H. L. regards this (agreement) as definitely instituting co-operation between themselves and the N. H. L. and appropriate to the friendly relations and understanding with which the N. H. L. appreciated the problem. After a frank and amicable discussion the players between the two bodies was signed."
