THE Patriot last evening contains an exclusive special despatch that William McMillan, Montserrat, has won a \$300 exhibition at McGill. The news appeared in The Guardian several months ago.

The cablegram for the Cheese Board which arrived two days for the meeting yesterday was as follows: Montreal dull, English Market steady, Montreal 11 to 11 1/2, English 56, 57, Brockville 10 1/2 to 11.

ANOTHER match, Lawyers versus All-comers will be played at the Golf Links this afternoon. Play to begin at 2.15 sharp. Probably several officers from the Alert will play on the side of the All Comers.

YESTERDAY afternoon Mary Jane McMillan paid her fine of \$200 for second offence against the Prohibition Act, and Elizabeth McMillan went down to jail for two months. She paid later and was released.

A BICYCLE owned by Professor C. J. McMillan was taken from the yard of his home on Powall Street several nights ago. It has not yet been recovered but a young lad living in the eastern part of the City is a suspect.

A. HORNE & Co. several days ago made a shipment via Pictou, of one of the finest lots of horses ever to leave the province. There were twenty-five in all and will be used in the Newfoundland timber lands. Next Wednesday they will ship twenty-five more to the same company.

THE death took place in Sydney a few days ago of Charles T. Hearne one of the most popular young men and best known athletes in that province. Mr. Hearne played against the Abegweits last winter in the Sydney games.

DR. E. J. GILLIS, of Kensington, P. E. Island, and bride, were in the city Monday en route to Montreal on their wedding trip. They were accompanied as far as Moncton by the groomsmen, Archibald Gillis, and the bridesmaid, Miss Maggie Higgins.—Moncton Times.

THE City of London had 75 passengers from East River Ports yesterday morning. The cargo consisted of 49 bbls oysters, 20 cases eggs and 5 head of cattle for local dealers. Owing to a large accumulation of freight at Vernon River she will make a special trip to that port on Monday next to relieve the congestion.

THE Coban arrived at 10.30 yesterday morning from Montreal with a full cargo of general merchandise. She sailed last night for the Sydneys and Newfoundland with a full cargo including 3000 bags oats, 350 bags vegetables, 120 barrels do, 250 cheese, 120 tubs butter, 198 sheep, 12 head cattle and five horses beside sundries.

H. M. S. ALBERT was at Queen's wharf yesterday being coaled by A. Lyons & Co. It is a long time since a warship moored at any of our wharves. This afternoon Mayor Warburton will entertain the Commander and several of the officers to a drive in the country. She sails tomorrow evening for Jacksonville, Florida.

AT Georgetown before S. Blanchard, Prosecutor W. H. Bears secured a conviction for second offence against Richard Kehoe. A case against Julian Sampson was dismissed for want of evidence. Prosecutor Bears will be pleased to receive information against offenders which may be forwarded to his address at Peter's Road thus greatly helping along the cause.

THE funeral took place Thursday afternoon from her late residence at the People's Cemetery of the late Mrs. John F. Hutchison. The pallbearers were Theo. Moore, Augustus Down, Geo. Rackham, Isaac Carter, Thomas Strickland and Dr. J. H. Ayers and there was a large attendance of friends. The services at the house and grave were conducted by Rev. W. W. Lodge.

A FATAL accident occurred on Tuesday to a P. E. I. man at the mills of the Forest Paper Company, of Yarmouth, Maine. The victim was Albert Blanchard, a man about 45 years of age, who was employed as a liquor runner. Blanchard was throwing on a belt when in some way his clothes caught in the main shafting. The shaft was making 110 revolutions per minute at the time of the accident. The machinery was stopped almost instantly when his fellow workmen perceived the man's awful plight, but Blanchard was dead before he was released. The back of his head was crushed and one leg and arm were badly torn and mangled. Blanchard was born in Prince Edward Island, but removed to Maine when quite a young man. He is survived by a widow and seven children.

THE regular fortnightly meeting of the board was held yesterday afternoon. Stewart 150. There was no cablegram but Brockville was quoted by A. J. Biffin at 10 1/2 to 10 3/4. The best bid was 11 1/2 by John Wheatley. He took Hazelbrook, Hillsboro, Cornwall, Red House, New Glasgow. The second call was 11c by Horace Hazard but none would accept the offer. The next meeting will be in two weeks time when the Secretary's report will be submitted. The buyers present were Horace Hazard, R. E. Spillet, John Wheatley, A. J. Biffin, Mr. Smith of Smith & Proctor, Halifax.

REV. Dr. Sinnott of St. Dunstan's College has kindly consented to deliver a lecture in the B. I. S. Hall during the early part of November, the proceeds of which will be in aid of the Whelan Monument Fund. Those who have heard the Rev. Dr. in the pulpit and on the platform know that a rare intellectual treat is in store for the public of this City. Subject will be announced later.

S. F. WALLACE, representing the National Cash Register Co. of Dayton, Ohio is at the Davies. He has with him this time, some improved cash registers, which are well worthy of inspection by intending purchasers. Mr. Wallace showed The Guardian representative his samples and he is always pleased to show them to all persons whether they purchase or not. He will be here for a week or so.

THE Gloucester fishing steamer Alice M. Jacobs arrived at Whitehead, N.S. Thursday and is now lying at Well's wharf taking on water. Capt. Sol Jacobs left Sydney yesterday and is now on his way home, having to cut his trip, short owing to lack of coal. The Dominion Government refused him a permit to purchase the same. Capt. Jacobs reports the weather very windy about Cape Breton and no mackerel schooling. He left eleven American seiners lying in Sydney with no fish.

HON. D. FERGUSON, of P. E. Island passed through yesterday on his way home from Ottawa. To a St. John Star reporter Senator Ferguson said it is the general impression about Ottawa that there will be no election this year and that the election will certainly be another session of parliament. Some members of the party go even so far as to claim that there will be two more sessions. The belief that there will be no general election is based on the well founded story that the liberal members from the provinces of Quebec demanded an increased indemnity on account of the present unusually long session and that the government put them off for the time being by stating that while the increase should, perhaps, be granted, it is too late now to bring the matter up, but another short session will be held, by means of which matters will be squared. Still the parties are preparing for an election and may look for the contest in January.—Moncton Times.

At the home of her parents, Winifred South Oct. 19th, 1903, Bessie F. Pickard, aged 22 years, departed this life.
