Funeral services for the late Mrs. Lillian H. Brehaut, nee McCormack, of 13 Stevens St., below wife of Hedley W. Brehaut, who passed away suddenly at her home with a heart attack last Saturday were held on Tuesday morning by the Charles W. Messer & Son Funeral Home at 2:30 o'clock with the Rev. Arthur J. Snow of the First Congregational Church officiating.

The deceased, who was in her 74th year, was born in Prince Edward Island, daughter of the late Alexander and Eliza McCormack, nee Lyle, and had been a resident of Stoneham for the past twenty years, during which time she gained for herself a host of friends.

A devoted, home-loving woman by nature, she was held in high esteem by the residents in the neighborhood. Surviving is her husband, Hedley W. Brehaut, and five children, Mrs. Donald Glynn, of Stoneham, Mrs. Ruth Wilson of Boston, Mrs. C. B. Moore of Alberta, Mrs. Virgil Cressman of Saskatoon, and Mr. Earl Brehaut of Moncton, N. B. Economic Life In Maritimes

(Editor's Note: This is the first of two stories dealing with the economic life of the Maritimes. Today: The background. Tomorrow: What lies ahead.)

(By Dave McIntosh, Canadian Press Staff Writer) - The Maritimes today resemble a mountain climber who has reached a difficult ledge and faces further obstacles.

Nearly all the 1,200,000 persons living in the Atlantic Provinces will be deeply affected within the next year or two by economic problems peculiarly Maritime and by the struggle to find their solution. Whether he is a logger on New Brunswick's racing Miramichi, a farmer working the red soil of Prince Edward Island or a coal miner deep underground in the pits of Nova Scotia, events taking shape now will play a big part in the Maritimer's personal life.

Decades ago the Maritimes formed the focal point of Canada's life and commerce. Following the First World War they slipped behind Central Canada but regained a measure of prosperity during the second. They now stand at almost the same point as they did after the first war. Either they move forward or fall back again.

What is the background for prosperity or depression? Which way is the trend? There are signs on both sides. For instance, there is the rising coal production, a boom in lumber, the heavy demand for steel, the move to reclaim marshlands inundated by the mighty waters of Fundy, the increasing impact of the co-operative movement and other bright signs.

Many Handicaps But there are debits: Unemployment, loss of British markets by the apple-growers, lack of small industries, wage differentials that draw workers to Central Canada, a falling fish market, and now, the boost in freight rates.

(A recent survey by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics said the Maritimes are not as prosperous as the rest of Canada. They have been beset, it said, by a long history of adverse economic conditions, small-scale and near-subsistence industry, vulnerability of specialized industries (in Nova Scotia), relative lack of urbanization and of accumulated wealth. The economic bottlenecks of the Maritimes stem from three main causes—transportation, lack of industry and lack of sufficient water power.

Only two single-track lines, one that shoots hundreds of miles north and through Quebec and the other that snakes across Maine, connect the Maritimes with Central Canada. For at least five months of the year the St. Lawrence River route is cut off by ice. Overland freight hauls are long and costly. With no big industries other than coal and steel, manufactured goods must be imported. The farmer harvests with a binder made in Ontario, the logger uses a bulldozer built in Quebec, the miner a joy-loader manufactured in the United States. Some fisherman even employ trawlers built in Britain.

It is the same with many other necessities, and almost all luxuries. P. E. I. Disadvantages Prince Edward Islanders, to boot have the added water haul across Northumberland Strait to overcome. This is what prompted Premier J. Walter Jones to remark recently: "We have to work harder and cheaper than anybody else in Canada to stay in the running at all."

Of the countless elaborate schemes designed to overcome these stumbling blocks nearly all have stalled—the Chignecto and Shubenacadie canals to shorten the water route to Montreal, the Passamaquoddy and Petitcodiac power projects, the Northumberland and Canso causeways and various railway projects.

Some war-born industries have slipped away. Pictou shipyards in northern Nova Scotia, fed by the close-by Trenton steel works, have shut down. So has the steel-plate mill at Sydney, industrial heart of the Maritimes.

While immigrants are being brought into other Provinces, more than 2,000 Maritimers have gone to Ontario or Quebec to look for work or have had their way paid there by the Federal Government as part of a manpower-transfer program.

However, a big ship-building contract for Halifax yards, a general boom in prospect in construction and an increasing program of public works and highway construction are all scheduled for the immediate future. They are already reducing unemployed ranks.

Maritime Grievances

When the freight-rate increase was announced, however, the outburst from the Maritimes was immediate—angry and bitter. The phrase "forgotten ports" found in Halifax several weeks before turned into "forgotten Maritimes." The protesting Maritimer generally follows one of two arguments. He charges discrimination and seeks to justify the use of his ports and a decentralized industrial policy as economically sound practice. Or he admits his geographical obstacles and demands Federal aid which he stoutly maintains was part of the Confederation compact and necessary to give a standard of living equal to his Quebec and Ontario compatriots. The terms of Confederation are no less applicable now than they were 81 years ago for the distance

Exciting Career Professor's Lot During Wartime

WINNIPEG, April 20 - (CP) - Commando raids, airborne training and an escape after the fall of France during the Second World War are only a few items from the book of experiences of Professor Jean L. Launay, chairman of the Romance language department of McGill University.

Prof. Launay came to Winnipeg to address a group of McGill graduates and the Alliance Francaise, a branch of the Canadian Legion, at its Vimy dinner.

Until the outbreak of war in 1939, Prof. Launay held a chair of English at the University of Rennes, in Normandy. Later he was called up with the French army, serving as liaison officer with the 2nd British Army Corps in 1940 and later with Bauman's division.

Bauman's division was an unofficially organized group made up of British soldiers stranded in France after Dunkirk; French soldiers returning from leave, and discharged hospital cases. Several of these unofficial groups existed for a short while before the armistice between France and Germany, Prof. Launay said, adding that they took their names from their company commanders.

Prof. Launay escaped to Portsmouth, England, in a tiny sailboat after the peace settlement between France and Germany. He was interned on arriving in England.

"I was furious, but they were very nice to me," he smiled. Prof. Launay escaped after being taken to internment camp at the Aintree race course, and managed to enlist in the Royal East Kent Regiment, oldest unit in the British Army.

Rose From Ranks

He enlisted as a private, rose to the rank of acting lieutenant-colonel between Toronto and Halifax has not lessened. But the hard-working Maritimer is not content to merely record his deed and let things slide. Like his ancestors who built the wooden fleet that carried a good deal of the world's trade, he is seeking to help himself by taking measures to get the best out of what industry has through a program of rehabilitation.
