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THE COOK'S CORNER

HAGGIS (GENUINE SCOTCH)

"Procure the large stomach-bag of a sheep also one of the smaller bags called 'King's Hood', together with the pluck, which is the lights, liver and heart. The bags must be well washed, first in cold water, then plunged in boiling water and scraped. Great care must be taken of the large bag; let it lie and soak in cold water, with a little salt, all night.

"Wash also the pluck. You will now boil the small bag along with the pluck, in boiling water, the windpipe attached and let the end of it hang over the edge of the pot, so that impurities may pass freely out. Boil for 1 1/2 hours and take the whole from the pot. When cold cut away the windpipe and any bits of skin or gristle that seem improper.

"Grate a quarter of the liver (not using the remainder for the haggis) and mince the heart, lights and small bag very small, along with half pound of beef suet. Mix all this mince with two small teacups of oatmeal, previously dried before the fire, black and Jamaica pepper and salt; also add half pint of the liquor in which the pluck was boiled, or beef gravy. Stir all together into consistency.

"Then take the large bag, which has been thoroughly cleaned, and put the mince into it. Fill it only a little more than half full, in order to leave room for the steam and meat to expand. If crammed too full it will burst in boiling. Sew up the bag with a needle and thread. The haggis is now complete. Put it in a pot with boiling water and prick it occasionally with a large needle, as it swells, to allow the air to escape. If the bag appears thin the cloth, outside the skin. There should be a piece of cloth underneath it, to prevent it sticking to the bottom of the pot. Boil it for three hours. Serve in a napkin on a dish, without garnish or gravy, if being sufficiently rich in itself.

Gift Fruit Cake En Casserole (Baked weight, about 5 1/2 lbs.) One cup seedless raisins, 1 cup uncooked prunes, 1 cup uncooked dried figs, 3/4 cup citron, 1/2 cup cut preserved orange peel, 1 cup halved candied cherries, 1 cup broken walnut meats, 1/2 cup jelly, 1/4 cup orange juice, 1 teaspoon allspice, 2 teaspoons cinnamon, 1 teaspoon mace, 1-1/4 cups butter, 5/4 cup brown sugar, 3/4 cup white sugar, 4 eggs, 2 teaspoons vanilla extract, 3-1/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour, 1-2 teaspoon soda, 3-4 teaspoon salt.

One cup seedless raisins, 3-4 cup broken walnut meats, 3-4 cup halved candied cherries, 1/2 cup jelly, 1/4 cup orange juice, 1 teaspoon allspice, 2 teaspoons cinnamon, 1 teaspoon mace, 1-1/4 cups butter, 5/4 cup brown sugar, 3/4 cup white sugar, 4 eggs, 2 teaspoons vanilla extract, 3-1/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour, 1-2 teaspoon soda, 3-4 teaspoon salt.

One pound fat pork (no lean), 2 eggs, 3 cups brown sugar, 1-2 cup baking molasses, 1 cup strong black coffee, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 teaspoon nutmeg, 2 teaspoons baking powder (heaping), 1 pint hot water, 7 cups flour (use 2 of these to dredge the fruit), 2 pounds raisins, 2 pounds currants, 1 pound dates, 1/2 pound lemon and orange peel, 1/2 pound citron, 1/2 cup crushed pineapple drained, or 1/2 cup candied pineapple, 1/2 cup cherries drained, or 1/2 pound glacé cherries, 1 cup nut meats, 1/2 cup ground nutmeats, 1/2 cup ground pork fine and hot to mix, 1/2 pint hot water. Cool and add coffee, sugar, molasses, beaten eggs. Sift flour, soda, baking powder and spices together and add to mixture. Grind carefully with nut meats, pineapple and peel. Necessary add other fruit and dredge thoroughly with 2 cups of the flour. Add to the batter. Fill pans half full and steam until two to three hours, according to the size of the pans. Put into a moderate oven from 1-4 to 1-2 hour, according to size, to dry the top. Line the pan with greased wax paper before putting in the mixture.
