ASKED TO ATTEND HIGHLAND GAMES

(By The Canadian Press) EDMONTON, July 3.—Lord Tweedsmuir, Canada's governor-general designate, will attend Highland Games here next year if he is "near Edmonton." On a specially prepared invitation card, signed by James A. McKinnon, chairman of the Highland Games Association, Lord Tweedsmuir, was congratulated on his appointment to the Governor-Generalship and invited to visit Alberta's capital. "I have to thank you for the most sumptuous invitation card I have ever received in my life," he replied. Alas, I fear there is no chance of my being at your High-land games this year. But you may be sure that if I am in the neighborhood of Edmonton next May I will certainly give myself the pleasure of coming to your games."

Lemuel Laird Gordon, Native Of P. E. Island Died In Vancouver

The death occurred due to peritonitis in the General Hospital early Wednesday morning, June 26, following a three-day illness of Mr. Lemuel Laird Gordon, president of Gordon & Belyea Limited. Mr. Gordon, who was in his forty-fifth year, was taken suddenly ill while playing golf. He was a native of Prince Edward Island and was educated at Charlottetown. He came to British Columbia in 1913 after following the banking business for several years, and started the firm of Gordon & Belyea in 1914. He was vice-president of International Paints (Canada) Ltd., Montreal, and of Western Bridge Company Ltd. He was a member of the Vancouver Club, Jericho Country Club and Board of Trade.

Mr. Gordon was born in Prince Edward Island in 1891. After completing his education at Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown, he came to Vancouver in 1913, and a year later established the firm which bears his name. In 1913, Mr. Gordon married Florence Armstrong, daughter of Edward Armstrong of Toronto. He was an enthusiastic golfer, and a prominent member of the Vancouver Board of Trade. Surviving are his wife, two sons, John and Robert, and one daughter, Betty, also his mother, Mrs. Alfred Gordon, and one sister, Mrs. Roy Quigley in Charlottetown. P. E. I. Another sister, Mrs. D. A. McRae, resides in Heatherdale, P. E. I., and two brothers, Earl and Lester F. Gordon, in Vancouver.—(Vancouver Sun.)

Report Given at Federated W. I.

AGRICULTURE REPORT Mrs. S. M. Martin, submitted the following report on Agriculture: Madame President, Officers, Institute Members, Visitors: It is with feelings of disappointment and satisfaction that I come before you at this Convention—the twenty-second of the Federal Women's Institutes of P.E.I., with my report as Convener of Agriculture. Disappointment that more of the Clubs have not made an effort to keep in touch with this very important department of W. I. work beyond the number shown taken advantage of the opportunity placed within their reach, to consider the problems in connection with agriculture, one of our leading industries in Prince Edward Island today. At the beginning of the year that is now closing, questionnaires were sent out to all the branch institutes comprising many subjects that were of interest to people who live in rural communities and who aim, at least, to make a living by farming. Special emphasis was placed on vegetables, weeds, poultry and calf clubs, and school fairs. There were 126 of the questionnaires returned to me, most of these giving evidence of having been carefully and intelligently considered. A considerable number showed a lack of proper consideration and a few were very poor indeed. I would like to make special mention of several that were particularly good: Mount Hope, Victoria, Caladonia, St. Felix, Eldon, Bellevue, P.E.I. Central Bedouque, St. Peter's Harbor, Grandview, Cumberland Hill, Bay View, Rose Valley, Sea View, Kingsboro, Cornwall, Hazelbrooke and Red Point. Letters were enclosed with several and these were very much appreciated by your Convener. Nearly all the Clubs sending answers were interested in vegetables and flowers at school and home and the great majority were doing their utmost towards the control of weeds while a few reported that they were doing nothing and that is a pity. Many splendid suggestions were made, such as proper and continuous cultivation, sowing good seed, clearing seed before sowing, pasturing sheep, not letting the weeds crowd out other crops. In this connection, it is encouraging to learn that an Associate Committee on weed control has been set up for the purpose of studying the problem of weeds in Canada and to make a report with recommendations on control and eradication. We are pleased to know that our Mr. Shaw of the Provincial Department of Agriculture, Charlottetown, is a member of this committee. Between eighty and ninety promised to study the National Poultry Breeder's Program and to co-operate with the Department of Agriculture in keeping up Canada's high standard in the development of the Poultry Industry.

Other questions were suggested: relative to the Marketing Board, the Co-operative organizations of the Province, the profitable growing of potatoes and turnips, the setting up of a standard acreage for potatoes, and still others reaching away beyond the bounds of the powers and possibilities of W. I. work, to say nothing of the rules and regulations. "What benefit has your institute been to your community?" Judging by the answers given to this question the Institutes of P. E. Island have been of inestimable value in many ways. Schools are kept clean and sanitary, the sick and shut-in have been comforted with fruit and flowers and in some cases hospital treatment has been secured; sewing clubs debating societies and singing schools have been organized; rinks, hockey clubs, calf clubs, Red Cross, halls and hospitals have been aided; books, prizes, maps, drinking fountains, flags, hot lunches and many other necessities and comforts have been provided for schools. Sidewalks have been repaired, halls and schools painted, lamps, window shades, and organs placed in halls, and last, though by no means least, the Institutes have been the means of bringing the women of the rural districts together in a spirit of love and friendship. In conclusion I would urge those of you who have failed to grasp the opportunity that was yours of keeping in touch with the work of this department, to make a special effort in the coming year to keep in step. To those of you who have given of your time and talent to make the work of this Department a profit to your Institute, a strength to the larger organization, and a pleasure to your Convener—you who have returned the questionnaires carefully considered, faithfully filled and promptly posted, a thousand thanks. PETITION SEEKS PRESERVE GAME (By The Canadian Press) ST. PAUL, Minn., July 3.—Presentation to President Franklin Roosevelt and Congress of a massed petition representing "263,550 individuals" demanding a closed water-fowl season and adequate federal enforcement funds has been announced by the Midwest Conservation Alliance. Characterizing the appeal as "the greatest unified sectional outburst for wild life preservation on record," the Alliance, plotted by regional and national wild life authorities, disclosed its domain as 14 states and the Canadian province of Saskatchewan. States represented are Minnesota, Wisconsin, Michigan, Nebraska, Missouri, Montana, North Dakota, South Dakota, Illinois, Iowa, Indiana, California, Utah and New York.

There were questions about the cutworm, the cabbage worm, the carrot-fly, how to plan a garden, how to lay out a lawn, how to get rid of thistles on school grounds and vermin on house plants, what causes brown heart in turnips, should fertilizer be used in growing flowers, what is the best kind of wheat grown on P. E. Island for flour value.

Scout News and Notices

A contributor furnishes additional information regarding the early history of the Boy Scouts Movement here. It was started about 1912 or 13 by Mr. Harvey Cross, Secretary of the Y.M.C.A., assisted by Mr. Fred C. Hines, and lasted about four years, the remnant of the troop turning out for the visit of the Prince of Wales in 1919. Vernon Maddigan and Frank Trainor organized League of Cross Troop (no charter) in 1920.

1st Charlottetown Troop organized in 1923 (Charter No. 5), Scoutmaster Leo F. MacDonald, Assistant Scoutmaster, W. J. Brawders, followed by Assistant Scoutmaster E. J. H. Morrissey. This troop later taken over by Scoutmaster F. J. Halpenny. Regular annual camps held under canvas (50-75 Scouts), attending physician, J. D. MacGuigan, M.D. Troop visited by Rev. G. T. Spriggs (Prov. Commissioner).

The Provincial Council was organized in Dec. 1922, with Hon. D. A. MacKinnon, K.C., as Commissioner; Mr. Vernon Maddigan, Assistant, and Mr. J. C. MacMillan, Secretary. The first Chartered Troops were: 1st Charlottetown (League of Cross); 2nd Charlottetown (King's Own); 3rd Charlottetown (St. James); 4th Charlottetown (Zion); 5th Charlottetown (Methodist); 6th Charlottetown (2nd League of Cross Troop).
