The retiring president, Emery Lyle presided at the meeting which opened with prayer by Archdeacon Harrison. A motion was passed that a letter of appreciation be sent to those who contributed to the auction held recently. It was also decided on motion that the annual Sunday School picnic of each parish be held on June 28th and that the entertainment committee be in charge. The matter of subscriptions to the Diocesan Times was taken up and Dr. E. E. Parkman was appointed to act as representative of the association. Annual reports were read showing that the past year had been an active one. The treasurer's report showed a good balance on hand. Mr. D. J. Heath gave a report for the entertainment committee and Mr. Eric Tanton for the boys' work committee. Archdeacon Harrison reporting for the Study Committee said that two subjects, Lambeth and the Book of Common Prayer were discussed. The president in his annual report said that ten regular and twelve executive meetings were held during the year and that over \$225.00 had been raised for church work. The money was spent in providing treats for the Sunday Schools of both churches, a picnic for both Sunday schools, interior decorating of St. Mary's Hall, boy's work and assisting the Youth Centre at Crapaud. Guest speakers during the year were Rev. S. J. Day, W. E. Darby and Davis Lidstone. The association was also visited by His Grace Most Rev. G. F. Kingston and His Lordship, Rt. Rev. R. H. Waterman. He expressed his appreciation to the women's organization for help and to the officers and members for hearty co-operation and support.—S.

H.M.C.S. Crescent To Return To Canada

OTTAWA, May 14 — (CP) — H. M. C. S. Crescent, Canadian destroyer which was sent to the Far East in February to evacuate Canadian nationals if necessary, is returning to Canada, naval headquarters said today.

R.C.N. officials said that the Canadian ambassador in China, T. C. Davis, had reported that "all Canadians desiring to leave have had ample opportunity to do so and that no useful purpose would be served by having the Crescent continue to stand by."
