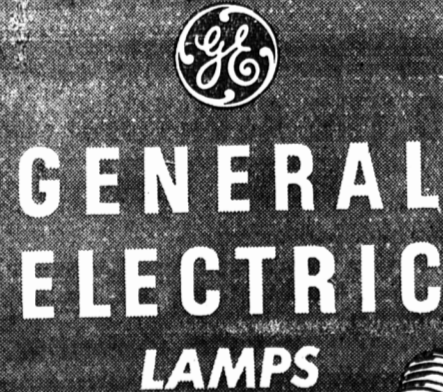

Report of the membership committee was given by Mr. Arthur Cow. Rev. J. H. LeClair, spiritual director spoke briefly to the meeting and commended the members of the Society for the way they are working and noted that a large number are attending holy communion on Holy Name Sunday. He urged them to continue doing so as this is the source of life.

One A Day Is Objective At Housing Project

One a day is the objective now in getting the houses now being built at the Summerside airport ready for occupancy, according to Mr. H. C. Reasin, who is in charge of the construction for the contractors, Bayville Construction Co. Ltd., of Sackville, N. B.

Four houses are now occupied. One family has been living there since December 22nd when the area, which is known as Slemon Park, was officially opened. The second one was occupied on Wednesday and two more were taken over on Tuesday.

Mr. Reasin said they hoped to average one a day till all of the 150 units have families in them. The power line is now being installed and 20 homes have been connected up. All of the buildings except ten of the duplex houses, which are for officers and senior non-commissioned officers, are closed in and these have about reached that stage.

Thirty-one houses have water and sewerage facilities installed. It was originally hoped to complete the project by March 31st but it will probably run over that time by about a month and this depends on weather conditions.

An additional 105 units have been authorized and it is expected that tenders will be called for these shortly. Between 145 and 160 men are now employed on the job and about three-quarters of these are local labor, Mr. Reasin said. The others are mostly from northern New Brunswick.—S.

Approve New Site For Federal Building At S'side

The proposed new site for the Federal building in Summerside has been approved by the Federal Department of Public Works. It was learned last night from Mayor J. P. Arnett, who had received a letter to this effect from Mr. W. P. Harrell, Assistant Deputy Minister of that Department.

This means that the building will be built on the former Saunders property on Central Street instead of the Allen property on Summer Street which was originally selected.

The proposal that the Town and Federal Government should exchange sites was first made by Mayor Arnett and the making of final arrangements for the transfer will be one of his last official acts as he is not seeking re-election.

The matter was carried through with the cooperation of the local member of Parliament, Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, Parliamentary Assistant to the Minister of Fisheries. As the Saunders property is about four times the size of the Allen property it is understood that the Town will receive a sum of money as part of the deal.

The Town is also reserving five feet on Church Street and five feet on Fitzroy Street so that these streets can be widened if necessary to prevent traffic congestion around the new building.—S.

Cut Over To Dial Phones At S'side Feb. 9

It was reliably though unofficially learned last night that the time for the cut-over to the dial telephone system in Summerside has been set for Thursday evening, February 9th at 10 o'clock.

This time is expected to become official today. Certain formalities are being planned for the occasion and the honor of making the first call will likely go to the Mayor of the Town.

This will be one of the first official duties of the new Mayor who will be elected tomorrow. The dial equipment arrived from England last July and installation work commenced in August.

It is an almost unbelievable maze of wiring and mechanical equipment to the layout and the work of setting it up was of an exacting nature and necessarily had to be proceeded with carefully and without haste.

This will also be the official opening of the new telephone building which was completed two years ago. The manual equipment presently in use is operated from the old building in the rear of the new structure.—S.
