MORE RUSSIAN TROOPS SENT INTO PERSIA.

ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 8.—The Russian Consul at Astrabad, Persia, has sent a telegraphic request for immediate reinforcements, in consequence of the frequent murders and robberies in the Province of Mazanderan, which border on the Caspian Sea.

The Province as a result of the struggle between the ex-Shah and the Government has been reduced to a state of anarchy. Three companies of infantry with machine and mountain guns have been ordered to Astrabad, one company has been detached to Balfrush, and one to Meshedizer.

The much advertised Sheep Meeting took place in Georgetown, the evening of February 3rd. John A. Gordon, President of Onward Farmers Institute in the chair. The attendance was good, the Sheep men being well represented. Quite a number drove in from Bridgetown and other points from a distance. Mr. McKinnon, Commissioner of Agriculture, was the first speaker. He congratulated the people of this section upon having a live institute, pointing out the good done by Institutes in general. In this particular case for having Mr. Ritchie with us to-night. When it became known that that gentleman was on the Island he was very much sought after from all over the country. However he was booked for only three meetings and Georgetown got one of them. Mr. Ritchie spoke for two hours with the assistance of charts and gave a very able and instructive address. He did not advise any particular breed, but thought the Down breeds would prove the most suitable for this Province. The lighter fleeces of the Downs would be equal in value to the long wools when the proposed Government assistance together with the co-operation of the Farmers in handling their wool in the new and up to date style which is proposed for 1913. The old system of tub washing is still in practice, when we tub wash our wool we mix all grades together, making all grade at best No. 2. The speaker advised putting up each fleece separately and shipping our wool in the grease also the great need of applying using a poisonous dip in the spring and a non poisonous in the fall, thereby increasing the amount of wool. Prof. Ross was next called upon, he was heartily cheered. The Prof. is well known in Georgetown. He gave a very earnest and witty address, pointing out the great need of keeping more live stock and feeding in the crops instead of exporting it in the raw state. Quite a discussion followed many questions asked and answered. The burning question of the dog nuisance was brought up by one of the audience and was answered by Mr. McKinnon, who thought it likely that this question would be brought up and disposed with at the next sitting of the Legislature. Before closing a vote of thanks was tendered to the Chairman and the Speakers.—Com.

SOUTH GREETINGS HEARST PAPER.

ATLANTA, Feb. 6.—Commenting on the purchase of the Atlanta Georgian by William Randolph Hearst, the Atlanta Constitution today prints the following editorial:—

The news that William Randolph Hearst has, by the purchase of the Atlanta Georgian, entered the South and made his chain of newspapers truly national, comprises an announcement of importance to Atlanta and so that large section of which this city is the strategic centre.

Regarding Mr. Hearst's policies in politics, there is no discounting the influence or constructive publicity that characterizes his publications. To be on a newspaper circuit stretching entirely across the continent as does the Hearst chain of dailies, and to be the beneficiary of the bold, aggressive Hearst advocacy of community enterprises and interests is a tangible asset. That is what Atlanta gains by the advent of Mr. Hearst.

Under his ownership the Georgian may be expected to energetically promote the movements placing Atlanta squarely in the limelight. The typical Hearst policy in this direction is shown by the persistency with which the Hearst newspapers went after the Panama exposition for San Francisco. It is not saying too much to assert that this influence was largely instrumental in sowing settlement that directed the location of the big show. Similar enterprises and similar initiative may be expected with the Hearst publication in Atlanta.

The Constitution cordially welcomes the new-comer. There is plenty of room in Atlanta, in Georgia and in the South for the sort of publicity that stimulates a people to the development of their assets, and that wakes up the world to the possibilities offered by its territory.

HUB TO LONDON PHONE POSSIBLE.

NEW YORK, Feb. 6.—"Telephoning from New York or Boston to London is entirely practicable," declares Professor Michael Idvovsky Pupin of Columbia University. "I don't know what the new Randall 'repeater' is, referred to in dispatches from Boston. But by means of the induction coil method which I worked out and sold ten years ago to the Bell Telephone Company, the Western Electric Company and the Seaman Brothers of Berlin, Germany, a London-New York or San Francisco-Honolulu, or Honolulu-Manila telephone awaits merely the commercial need for it."

Present telegraph cables probably could not be used. So the only difficulty in transatlantic telephony is one of capital—and capital's only difficulty is to assure itself of a recompensing demand.

"You know that, owing to difference in time, there are only two and one-half hours of our business day which comes within the London business day. The New York telephone would have to support itself really those two and one-half hours. It comes down simply to the question of demand."

Professor Pupin's invention, for which the Bell Company alone paid him \$200,000 flat and a royalty of \$7,500 a year during the life of the patent, is simplicity itself. It consists of coils of wire similar to ordinary induction coils, placed at intervals along the communicating wire. Each coil takes up the current and retransmits it in full energy to the next, and so on to the destination.

"They already have in operation a telephone cable under my system between England and Belgium, England and France and are negotiating for one between England and Germany," added Professor Pupin. "In this country there is being laid an underground conduct between Washington and Boston. It is completed between New York and Philadelphia and between Boston and Providence."
