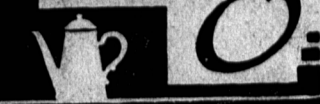

WEST POINT, N. Y., June 12—Members of the class of 1913 of the United States Military Academy received their diplomas from the hands of Col. Clarence P. Townsley, superintendent of the academy, this morning. On the platform were gathered Secretary of War Garrison; Major General Leonard Wood, the Chief of the General Staff, and many other distinguished people in military and civil life.

The honor man of the class was Cadet Francis K. Newcomer of Washington, D.C., a son of Lieut. Col. Henry C. Newcomer, U.S.A. Next in order of standing came Cadets G.R. Young of Montana, C. F. Williams of Massachusetts, R. W. Crawford, R.H. Nicholas of Pennsylvania, M. Bertam of Indiana, J. A. Dorst of California, R. W. Putnam of Minnesota, W. B. Roseyear, Jr., of Michigan, and L. K. Underhill of California.
In accordance with established custom the ten cadets of highest standing will go to the Corps of Engineers. The remaining members of the class will be assigned to the infantry and other branches of the service.
