By Sid Feder Associated Press Staff Writer NEW YORK, Feb. 25 (AP) - This is a storm warning. The big wind under the derby hat is going to reach gale proportions by summertime. Up to now, if you've been a sturdy citizen and knew where to hide, you had a chance to escape from James Joy Johnston's jawing, at least temporarily, simply because the reformed pugilist had only one fight to talk about at a time. But last night, one of James Joy's boys, Rapid Robert Pastor, flattened Lemuel Franklin to earn a shot at Joe Louis this summer. And today, Mike Jacobs announced that another occupant of the "Big Boy" ring, Simon, would smother the Bomber's bells March 27 in Madison Square Garden. So here on in, it's every man for himself when the derby heaves into view. Of course, these plans hinge on Louis getting leave from the army. Since the shindig with Simon will be for the benefit of the Army Emergency Fund and since the army, navy and marines may share in the one with Pastor, Uncle Sam probably will be glad to lend out his No. 1 bomber for a couple of one-night stands. In agreeing to take a few pokes at Ample Abe, Louis made the same grand gesture for the army as he did in his brief Navy Relief Fund against "Buddy" Beer last month. On that occasion, he passed his entire purse, minus only training expenses, into the benefit pot. This contribution, plus Jacobs' promotional profits, a donation by Madison Square Garden and Beer, made up an \$89,000 jackpot for the fund. The same conditions will go for the March affair. Transactions Between Primary Producers

OTTAWA, Feb. 24 - Farmers may dicker freely with their neighbors, barter seed supplies or implement parts, and bid on livestock at rural auctions without danger of committing a breach of the price ceiling regulations. But this relates exclusively to articles for their own use and not to purchases for resale. An Order of the War-time Prices and Trade Board, effective February 12, exempts transactions between primary producers of agricultural products, livestock, and poultry products. The order lists hay, grain, seed potatoes, onion bulbs, farm implements or repair parts, sacks, fencing, fence posts, milk cans, stockpings, nursery stock, poultry, poultry products, farm-made dairy products, wool, hides and other agricultural products and supplies; also custom milling, seed cleaning and other agricultural services. It provides that the exemption shall not apply to any sale, exchange or barter that is for the purpose of resale. Any product or article involved in transactions between producers becomes subject upon resale, to the Maximum Prices Regulations "unless otherwise permitted by any order of the Board." Livestock is already exempted from the ceiling by a Board order effective January 10 last. Poultry, eggs, milk, cream, dairy butter, maple syrup are not subject to any price ceiling when sold by producers to dealers or processors, but will be subject to the retail price ceiling, including sale by producers to consumers. The new regulation relates definitely to trade, barter and exchange of goods between farmers, ranchers and other primary producers. The spirit of the order is to permit free intercourse between primary producers in relation to things for their own use. For example, a farmer might swap something with a neighbor for sacks he needed in order to market potatoes, and the sale of his potatoes would not be regarded as a resale of sacks, such; they would be merely containers for the product marketed.
