As to this the representatives of the men declare it remains absolutely with the company, since from the start of the negotiations they have not changed their demands one iota, standing straight through for the standard wage rate of the territory.

A RAILWAY FATALITY. MIDDLETON, July 5—Nineteen persons were killed outright, three fatally hurt and six seriously injured in a head-on collision between a freight and passenger train on the Cincinnati, Hamilton and Dayton Railway. Eight were passengers.

The men were James Yostou, Pictou, and H. L. Hart, Halifax.

NEGROES WERE BLAWE AT FIRE.

NEW YORK, July 2—An early morning blaze which threatened to destroy several blocks of valuable front property along the Harlem River, was stifled by the firemen after a hard battle yesterday. The loss will not exceed \$100,000 although the fire reached a dozen warehouses and factory buildings, burned its way across the staff-covered structure of the amusement park, killed twenty horses and caused the loss of eight hundred chickens in a poultry warehouse. The loss is divided among twenty firms.

The blaze, while it lasted, was a spectacular one and was watched by a large number of persons from the river bridges overhead and the apartment houses on the heights back of the river. Two city blocks adjoining the poultry warehouse are occupied by negro families and the tenants were out in force by the time the fire reached this point. They were on hand carrying ice lines were formed and when a cry arose that the night watchman in the warehouse was missing, hundreds of negroes responded to a call for volunteers to go in search of him.

Using heavy poles and battering rams they broke their way through door after door in their effort to find the watchman, who, it developed, had rushed for a fire alarm box as soon as he had seen the flames. The search for the watchman was hardly over when the police arrived. They the volunteers and carrying a heavy freight of live poultry scurried back to their homes. Eight hundred chickens were reported either killed or missing.

\$1,000,000 LOST IN A LUMBER FIRE.

ARNPRIOR, Ont., July 5—One of the most disastrous conflagrations in the history of eastern Canada, outside the City of Ottawa, occurred at Gillies Brothers' lumber yards at Brasside last night. A rough estimate of the loss was made by a member of the firm puts it in the neighborhood of \$1,000,000. The fire originated in Gillies' main yard, situated on the east side of the C. P. R. track. The yard is of triangular shape and there are six sidings. In the yard there was about sixty million feet of lumber and this was completely destroyed.
