**The Holstein Breeders Meeting**

An important meeting of the Holstein Priesian breeders of the Province was held in the Agricultural Hall, Charlottetown on Friday Dec. 19th. Breeders from various parts of the Province were in attendance, and included Wm. Lea, J. W. Jones, W. Buntain, Alex Agnew, W. J. Gibson, Alex McKay, Cecil Stewart, Chas. Godfrey, Chas McKenzie, and Layton Jones.

The Holstein Priesian Field man for Canada Mr. H. M. Hartley was in attendance, and after the meet-

ing was called to order, the chairman, Mr. Lea, called upon Mr. Hartley to address the meeting. Mr. Hartley's address dealt mainly with the "Restricted Area Plan." This plan has been devised and put in operation by the Federal Health of Animals Branch with the object of complete eradication of tuberculosis in cattle in certain specified areas. Certain sections of Canada such as the Carmen District in Manitoba, and the Huntington district in Quebec, have already been placed under this plan, and it is working out very successfully. Mr. Hartley explained details of the system, and suggested that this island on account of its size and geographical position, should prove an ideal area for the successful operation of this plan.

The discussion which followed Mr. Hartley's address, was taken part in by practically every breeder present, all of whom agreed that it would be a splendid asset to this Province to have such a system successfully operated here. It was brought out that practically all of our pure bred breeders, are now operating under the accredited herd plan, the provision of which exclude the grade breeder from its benefits. A large number of the latter feel this an injustice. The Restricted Area Plan however, which provides for liberal remuneration in case of reactions, would remove this injustice, and would also remove, the present danger of contamination to pure bred herds under the Accredited Plan, alongside of grade herds. It was felt that the percentage of diseased animals here would be very low, such assumption being based on the available facts, derived from tests made in the pure bred and grade herds.

From a straight economic standpoint, the value of being able to advertise P. E. Island as a disease free area, would be tremendous. A guarantee of disease free cattle would undoubtedly attract buyers from all over the country, who would pay higher prices for grade dairy cattle. Enhanced prices for beef would also undoubtedly follow, while the benefits to hog raisers, would naturally be very material. To be able to advertise Island butter, cheese and milk, from disease free herds, would also be an undoubted boon to our dairy industry and would attract favorable attention to the markets of the world.

After these, and many other favorable points had been presented at the meeting, a resolution was drafted and signed all present favoring the operation of the Restricted Area Plan in this Province.

Discussion on the advanced Registration of Bulls, introduced by Wm. Lea, occupied considerable time. Bulls would be graded upon performance and individuality, and the qualifications for the highest grade or preferential, would in all probability be as high as to exclude all but a very few from this class. Mr. Lea was authorized to suggest to the Annual Meeting of the Canadian Holstein Priesian Association of which he is President that when the plan is finally adopted, that a committee of three be appointed to perform the grading.

Other matters discussed at the meeting were, the organization of a Boys Heifer Club; a field day during the next summer; a committee to take care of the details of which was appointed, and included J. W. Jones, Chas. McKenzie and Alex Agnew; and Organization for the preparation of show stock for the Royal. A meeting was partially arranged for at a later date to further matters of interest to the breeders.

The meeting was of a very beneficial nature. This is the first visit of the field man to our Province, and it is not too much to say that he was very much impressed with the quality of our stock and the care of the breeders. We have the assurance of a return visit, and with the prospects in view of work of a valuable character now launched, it is only reasonable to expect, that the Holstein breeders of the Island will be a vital force in the extension of disease free live stock, of high quality, and in the raising of the standard of dairy production.
