

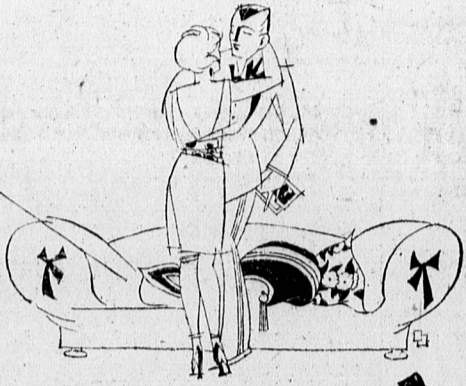

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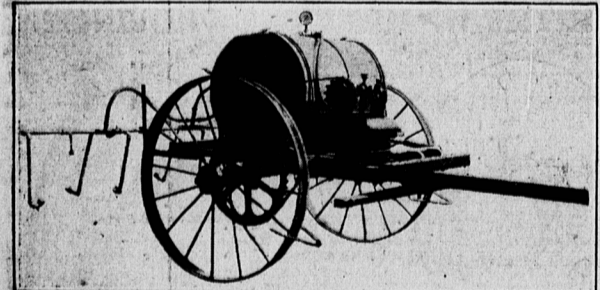

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Freedoms Battle Again

GOVERNMENT FROM OUTSIDE Trampling on Self Government.

Never before was there such a bold attempt made to trample on self-government and rule by outsiders as is now raging in this Province. It would not be tolerated in any of the other Provinces. What right have those outsiders to flood this island with speakers whose object is to rule this Province for the next four years? Read the following article from the Halifax Citizen and judge for yourself. Nay more! Be ready on Saturday next to resent the insult at the polls by marking your ballots for the Conservative candidates. It says:

MEDDLING IN P. E. I. ELECTIONS

The people of Prince Edward Island should resent interference in the political campaign by prohibition extremists from Nova Scotia or elsewhere. The Island has had a long experience of prohibition and the people are no doubt well able to judge its merits in the promotion of intemperance. They are in a much better position to settle the question wisely than any outsiders can be.

It is presumption for those who have been instrumental in having this disastrous legislation perpetuated in Nova Scotia to go into another province in the heat of a political contest and advise the people how to vote. Their action in doing so will no doubt have considerable influence toward the defeat of prohibition, and in that way may be productive of good.

The above article is most timely and should have the weight of a disinterested critic. Another matter comes to our mind at this point. Those invaders have made the most brazen efforts to break the Sabbath that were ever witnessed in our God-fearing Province. It is impossible to speak on one issue alone. All the issues of the contest are inseparably connected—all printed on the one ballot paper, so when stumping for Prohibition they are stumping for purely business matters—doing "servile work not of necessity."

Who has not heard those speak of haranguing audiences against Sabbath breaking in Quebec? And here at home we have heard some of their pious exhortations against a few boys having a game of ball, even when contested without a wager. Does it not show the greatest hypocrisy on the part of those unco guid reformers to find them engaged at servile work on the Lord's Day, and thus violating the Sabbath? It certainly does.

There can be a great deal said in regard to the civil features of this much-heralded law called Prohibition. In the first place it never can be enforced. There are too many favorites in the law-breaking business. What is needed is a law that deals out equal rights. This principle is embodied in the proposed Government Control Act. If placed on the Statute Book, as it will be on Saturday, it will have all shades of Public Opinion in its favor to see that all classes, rich and poor—are treated alike, and to condemn in thunder tones voting for the Act and then leaving its enforcement to blind chance.

This is what the country is looking for. Those who imported temperance orators must be taught a salutary lesson. The people here know what they are looking for. They have had twenty-years of prohibition of one kind or another but they have not succeeded in getting what they have been after in the Prohibition Act. So it must go to the discard pile. Let Government Control be tried and if found a failure throw it aside at the end of one year if necessary. The Legislature meets once a year and is in duty bound to comply with any amendment that serves their purpose. Let us have Home Rule, not imported rule. We have learned what imported temperance laws are ever since the Scott Act was first adopted. What was needed then was rigid license law. Let us have one now. Vote for Government Control and obtain a right home-made statute.

THE CLERGY AND POLITICS

Why Premier Stewart Has Courteously Declined Their Active Service In Support Of Government Control.

Rev. W. M. Ryan, who is leaving Trinity Church for St. John almost immediately, and can therefore escape the evil consequences of having divided his congregation is determined more than ever to make the going hard for his colleague and successor. What matters it to him? He'll be away, and others will have to reap the ill-will and discord he has sown in what he found a happy united congregation.

In yesterday's Patriot he claims that the ministers of the different denominations are practically behind Prohibition, and that practically none has spoken out against it.

Let us remind the reverend gentleman and our esteemed contemporary that the policy of the Conservative party has been to keep the churches out of politics. It was not that the supporters of Government Control had not offers of assistance from ministers. They had but courteously suggested that it would be better for the congregations to keep the pulpits free from party politics. One minister, of the Rev. Mr. Ryan's own denomination, probably the most highly esteemed on the Island, even offered his services to act upon the Government Control Commission and that without salary.

The letter of Rev. Mr. Ryan is nothing more nor less than an attempt to justify his most unjustifiable conduct in designating the leading laymen of his denomination Judas. Let us recall what we said on the subject on a previous occasion!

JUDAS

According to the Rev. W. M. Ryan his predecessor in the Brick Church, Rev. R. G. Fulton is a Judas because he approves of Improved Temperance under Government Control. By the same token, Mr. D. B. Hanna, one of the leading lights in the United Church in Toronto and chairman of the Toronto Commission is a Judas. And Mr. James Paton, a leading member of Mr. Ryan's Church and chairman of the Prohibition Commission, (which has made profits every year) a member of the official board of Mr. Ryan's Church, an elder, and chairman of the Central Relief Committee of Mr. Ryan's Church, is a Judas. And Mr. Henry Smith, the venerable father of Methodist officials, Secretary of the Prohibition Commission, a member of the official Board of Mr. Ryan's Church, a Trustee and an elder, is a Judas. And Sir John Willison, a distinguished member of the official board of the United Church of Toronto, is a Judas. Then there are those other exemplary church members and clergymen, like Rev. Thos. Goodwill, mentioned by Mr. W. L. Cotton in his articles on this page, each of these is a Judas, according to Mr. Ryan; while no doubt extremists like Mr. L. P. Tanton are the real ideal of what Christians should be.

It is the sort of extravagant language used by the Rev. Mr. Ryan, with the best intentions in the world, that the United Church official organ, the New Outlook regretted after the Ontario election as having done more harm than good.
