Montreal Exchange Report

Weekly Market

SUMMARY

Increasing supplies of grass cattle largely plain in quality. Quality was generally better during the past week. Prices in the east were down 15c to 25c and in western Canada were off 25c to 50c. Cattle prices showed some weakness but hogs were stronger at principal centres while sheep and lambs showed little change.

Eastern Cattle Markets

Cattle prices were down 15c to 25c on steady steers at Toronto but steady on other killers. Quality was generally below normal. Some choice weighty steers were taken at \$15 to \$15.50 and butcher steers up to \$14. Trading at Montreal was fairly active with good showing a stronger trend. Good steers were priced at \$14 to \$14.50 and good cows from \$10.25 to \$10.75 with some tops at \$11. In the Maritimes best steers and heifers were quoted at \$14 for country points on a light offering.

Western Cattle Markets

While cattle supplies were not burdensome at Winnipeg, however, the market developed a lower trend on grassers and prices were down 25c to 50c. Some good dry-fed steers and heifers were in demand and prices were up to \$13.50 on steers at \$15.50 and most steers in Calgary some strictly choice steers sold at \$14.25 on a lower market and most grass steers were \$13 to \$14. With prices about 50c lower Edmonton had steers up to a top of \$14.50. Prince Albert made up to \$12.25 on grassers. Moose Jaw \$14 to \$14.50 on dry-feds and up to \$12.50 on grass steers. Saskatoon \$13.25 on grassers, Regina \$12 to \$13.50, and Vancouver \$13 to \$13.75.

Exports to United States

Exports of dairy cattle to the United States in the past week totalled 1085 head compared with 1837 in the same week last year. Exports since January 1 this year are 26,827 and in the corresponding period last year totalled 39,220.

Steady Calf Market

There was little change in the calf market situation. Toronto was steady at \$16 for best veals. Montreal slightly easier with good veals up to \$15 and an odd \$15.50. Winnipeg up to \$15. Calgary lower from \$12.50 to \$13. Prince Albert \$12.50 to \$14. Price at Saskatoon up to \$13.50. Regina \$14 and Vancouver \$13 to \$14.

Hogs Again Stronger

Hog prices moved up at a number of centres by about 25c. Toronto gained to a close of \$22.75 for Grade A, Montreal \$23 while Winnipeg held unchanged at \$20.40 to \$20.70. Calgary was firmer at \$27 with Edmonton \$27.50 for shipment. Prince Albert, Moose Jaw, Saskatoon and Regina \$20.15, Vancouver \$22.25 and Charlottetown \$21.75. The latter price f.a.b.

Little Change in Lamb Market

There were only slight fluctuations in the lamb market. Toronto lost 25c selling good lambs mostly at \$17.25, while Montreal was firmer at \$16 to \$16.50. Winnipeg about steady up to \$15.50. Calgary \$7 down at \$13.50 to \$12.75. Edmonton \$14. Prince Albert \$13.50 to \$14. Moose Jaw \$13.50. Saskatoon up to \$14. Regina \$14.50.

Trading Dull On Montreal Exchange

MONTEBELL, July 31—(CP)—Following declines on the two previous sessions securities displayed moderate recovery tendencies on the stock exchange and dull market. Trading was curbed and the stock market was unchanged in utilities. Range of the price changes was small.

Closing averages of the Montreal exchange listed papers up 2.29 to 348.65; industrials up 3 to 123.2; utilities up 1 to 78.1; golds off 50 to 72.20. Industrial volume was deflated to the 18,600 share market and mining volume to the 28,000 shares.

Selected issues among newprints were improved. St. Lawrence Corporation advanced 3-4 at 15 and Brown 1-8 at 5. Trading on Consolidated divided to fewer than 1,000 shares but the stock advanced 1-8 at 18 1-2. Price Brothers pushed ahead 1-2 point at 61 1-2 while Abitibi Common was unchanged at 17 3-4.

Canadian Industries was the heaviest trader in the generally quiet industrial sub-group, up 1-2 at 23 1-2. Fleet advanced 1-4 at 2 1-2.

Highway Traffic Act

CONFORMING WITH THE SAFETY WEEK CAMPAIGN

The following digest of the Highway Traffic Act Sections is for public information.

SPEED OF TRUCKS

Section 35, sub-section 2, provides that no person shall drive a truck, the weight of which unladen exceeds two tons, at a speed greater than 25 MILES PER HOUR.

SPEED AT CURVES AND RAILWAY CROSSINGS

Section 35, sub-section 3, provides that any person driving a motor vehicle upon a highway at a speed greater than 15 MILES PER HOUR within 50 ft. of a curve or level railway crossing, when the driver has not a clear vision shall, prima facie, be deemed to be driving in other than a careful and prudent manner.

SPEED IN VILLAGES, ETC.

Section 35, sub-section 3, provides that any person driving a motor vehicle at a rate of speed exceeding 20 MILES PER HOUR on any public highway or street in any village, city or incorporated town, shall, prima facie, be deemed to be driving the motor vehicle in other than a careful and prudent manner.

SPEED PASSING SCHOOLS

Section 35, sub-section 3, as amended, provides that any person driving a motor vehicle at a speed exceeding 20 MILES PER HOUR while approaching or passing a school on a school day, shall, prima facie, be deemed to be driving the motor vehicle in other than a careful and prudent manner.

SPEED—MOTOR CARS, BUSES AND LIGHT TRUCKS

Section 35, sub-section 5, provides that no person shall operate a motor vehicle on a highway at a greater speed than 40 MILES PER HOUR.

SPEED WHEN MEETING OTHER MOTOR VEHICLES

Section 35, sub-section 4, provides that any person operating a motor vehicle on a highway at a greater speed than 30 MILES PER HOUR when meeting a vehicle after sunset or before sunrise shall, prima facie, be deemed to be driving in other than a careful and prudent manner.

SPEED GENERALLY

Section 35, sub-section 1, provides that every person driving or operating a motor vehicle on a highway, shall drive and operate same in a careful and prudent manner.

N. Y. Stocks In Recovery Move

(By Victor Eshank)

NEW YORK, July 31—(AP)—Stocks today ended July with a substantial recovery move that, while unusually slow, enabled market leaders to get back fractions to 3 or more points of their recent relapse.

The Associated Press 60-stock composite was up of a point at 66.8, which equaled the advance of July 24. For the month the gain was 2 1/2 points. The June advance was 3 points.

Canadian issues were almost unchanged from noon quotations. Canadian Pacific and Distillers Seagrams were each up 3-8. McIntyre lost 1-2. Dome Mines was unchanged. On the curl and Giant Yellow Knife closed off 1-4.

Bethlehem Steel was up 3 3-4 at \$9 1-2 and, after the close, the usual \$1.50 dividend was voted. Net for the June quarter of \$3.81. A share was reported against \$4.84 in the initial three months and \$4.39 in the 1946 June period. Results were about in line with Wall Street expectations.
