The Royals, Quebec's initial final representative in 23 years of cup play, gained the triumph on a pair of goals by blond Ken Mosdell. Bunny Glover added a third in the last period upstaging to put the teams all even for the third of the best-of-five series, scheduled for Toronto Saturday.

Cincinnati Turns on Cards For 3-2 win

NEW YORK, April 24—(AP)—Cincinnati Reds turned the tables on Cardinals at St. Louis today, scoring a run on Lonnie Frey's ninth-inning double to win 3-2.

Three times in a row at the start of the National League season the Cardinals stopped the Reds and twice victory came in the ninth.

At Pittsburgh, an infield hit by Rip Collins with the bases loaded gave Pirates a 2-1 victory in 11 innings, breaking a four-game losing streak for the Buccs.

At Brooklyn, Luke Hamlin, the "hot potato" pitcher of the Dodgers, turned in his second straight low-hit job, downing the lowly Philadelphia Phillies 6-1 before a crowd of 2,578.

Downing the National League cellar-occupant for the second day in a row, the Dodgers presented a revamped lineup and settled the issue early with a two-run attack in the second inning, headed by Dolph Camilli's fourth homer of the year.
