Summerside mourns the passing of a most worthy, popular and revered citizen, in the person of Mr. John A. Bruce, who died Saturday evening at the age of 82 years. His familiar figure was sadly missed from the streets of the town he loved and served so faithfully. He was loved in everything for the betterment of the community.

In early life he united with the Christian Church and received a devoted and consecrated worker in the former Methodist Church (now the United Church of Canada) and when the late Governor Dundas laid the cornerstone of Trinity United Church, Charlottetown, May 24th, 1863. He was privileged to attend the 71st Anniversary in November, 1936, and he was the only person living who had been present at the laying of the cornerstone of the United Church of Canada in his town of Summerside. He was a devoted and zealous worker of the Methodist, Presbyterian and Congregational bodies, he was a trustee of Trinity United Church. He was a Charter Member of the Summerside Young Men's Christian Association and gave liberally of time and means in support of the institution.

In formal circles, he will be affectionately remembered as a Life Member of Hiram and Lebanon Lodge, No. 3, A. F. and M., and a Past Master of this Lodge. On the 50th Anniversary of his admission into the Craft, the Grand Lodge of Prince Edward Island presented him with a Jewel as a token of affection and regard, and at the time of his passing into the presence of the Supreme Grand Master to receive the Crown of Life he had completed 61 years of fellowship with his Lodge.

The door has gently closed between him and those he loved so well but the joy of his presence, his genial smile, and friendly greeting will linger with unending sweetness during all the coming days. To the inner circle who mourn his passing, the heartiest sympathy of the community will be extended. These comprise his widow, formerly Miss Margaret Howatt of Tryon, one surviving daughter, the late Mrs. J. Summerside, and one son, George R. Bruce, the honored mayor of Tofield, Alberta. One daughter, Mrs. J. Summerside, is also surviving. The funeral will be held this afternoon at 2 p. m. from Trinity Church.
