**GALICIAN WOMEN WILLING TO WORK FOR TREASURY**  
WARSAW, Jan. 29.—Galician women have expressed their willingness to collect gold, silver and jewelry to be used as a basis for new currency. Forty women's organizations have addressed the Polish Government, offering their services in the national treasury.

**GERMANY MAKES PAYMENT**  
PARIS, Jan. 28.—The German Government has notified the reparations commission that 31,000,000 gold marks have been deposited in various banks in compliance with the ten day payment schedule adopted by the commission at its recent Supreme Council meeting at Cannes. The first payment of 31,000,000 gold marks under this schedule was made by Germany on January 28.

**Berlin Thieves Get Millions Entente Facing Another Peril**

**BERLIN, Jan. 29.**—The arrest here of a "distinguished" gang of shop thieves whose loot already amounts to about 10,000,000 marks in value is one of Berlin's sensations. The further sensation in this connection has been caused by revelations that the thieves bribed some of the members of the Charlottetown police force to hush evidence, and that had it not been for this bribery the gang would have been arrested some time ago. The arrest of the leader of the gang, a woman named Dora Roebber who is the mother-in-law of a high Government official, and her principal accomplice, Ann Paerstry, occurred under dramatic circumstances. A few days before Christmas two richly-dressed women, wearing expensive fur coats and jewels, entered a fashionable store in Berlin's shopping district. They said they wanted to buy Christmas presents. While showing them different objects a shop assistant observed one of the women trying to steal an expensive object.

**REQUIEM HIGH MASS**—At St. Dunstan's Cathedral yesterday morning Pontifical Requiem High Mass for the repose of the soul of the late Supreme Pontiff, Benedict XV, was celebrated by His Lordship Bishop O'Leary, assisted by Revs. F. Mullally and R. St. John with Rev. J. Parker and Rev. L. Smith as Deacon and sub-deacon of office. Rev. Maurice McDonald, high priest, Rev. William Monaghan, master of ceremonies. An excellent sermon fitting to the occasion was delivered by His Lordship the Bishop.

**THE SHOPKEEPER BLUFFED**  
When the assistant accused her of this the woman became excited and protested vigorously. Mistaken by the attitude of the woman, the shop assistant apologized, whereupon the two women left the store. The next day two well-dressed women called on the owner of the shop. They told him they were the husbands of the woman and showed him their pocket wallets stuffed with thousands of marks, asking him if he thought the wives of men who were so wealthy were obliged to steal. The shop owner, who gave them a written apology, was considerably different in attitude between the two men and the two women aroused the suspicion of the shop owner, who told the police of the circumstances. An investigation was started, which led to the arrest of a large number of the members of the gang.

**Military Funeral Yesterday of Gnr. Samuel Murphy**  
The funeral of the late Samuel Murphy took place from his late residence, Haviland St., yesterday at 8.45 to St. Dunstan's Cathedral, thence to the Roman Catholic Cemetery. A Requiem High Mass was celebrated at the Cathedral by Rev. R. St. John, services at the cemetery being conducted by Rev. F. Mullally. The funeral cortege was the largest seen here for some time, the order of the procession being, Firing Squad, 105th Band, nights of Columbus, friends, carriage, hearse, mourners, friends.

**Stolen Goods Worth Millions**  
When the police searched Dora Roebber's extravagantly furnished home they found stolen goods worth millions of marks, and learned that the thieves had opened big bank accounts in Germany and in Holland, where most of the goods stolen in Germany were taken and disposed of. Their list comprised goods, carpets, cutlery and jewelry. Practically every one of Berlin's fashionable shops has a list of the operations of the gang.

**Source of Sun's Heat Mystery**  
Scientists Have Yet to Solve the Problem of Big Engine in the Sky

**Source of Sun's Heat Mystery**  
The source of the sun's energy is unknown by astronomers and physicists, but Dr. H. D. Curtis of the Allegheny observatory of the University of Pittsburgh believes that this energy may be produced from subatomic forces. He says that the breaking up of atoms rather than from reactions between molecules of ordinary chemical and physical processes.

**Source of Sun's Heat Mystery**  
The disintegration of radium elements of about 10 million times more energy than is produced by the sun there certainly is lead and helium, both of which are the radioactive children of their parent uranium. The existence of radium has been suspected in the sun. But radium alone is not sufficient as a source of the solar energy. Were the sun composed entirely of radium and its various radioactive products in the proportion the heat involved would only be about one-fourth of the amount the sun loses by radiation. Uranium loses half its power in about 5 billion years.

**Source of Sun's Heat Mystery**  
Astronomers are driven thus to a confession of ignorance; they do not know precisely how the sun's heat is maintained. The most probable assumption, and it is largely based on the fact that the sun is a star, is that there may well be some disintegration in the atoms of other sorts from such stores of subatomic energy comes the greater part of the sun's truly prodigious outflow of energy.

**Source of Sun's Heat Mystery**  
Thirty years ago the general belief was that the heat of the sun was produced by the resistance of friction between particles of matter that contracted and expanded. This contraction and expansion would produce heat in the same manner as a piston in an engine.
