Immigrant Girl Treated At Sea

HALIFAX, July 20 — (CP) — A 20-year-old Halifax domestic, Minnie Harnish, tonight put away the prospect of an early marriage to David Boyes, 21, who braved the wrath of the Royal Marines, merchant ships' officers and immigration officials in vain attempts to reach her side.

Miss Harnish said she received a note from Boyes dated July 16 in New York saying he was sailing back to Britain on the liner Queen Elizabeth, deported by United States authorities after his fifth attempt to get to Halifax as a stowaway ended in his capture and detention on Ellis Island.

The girl, who said she had made countless attempts to find a job for Boyes so he could come here and marry her, expressed fear she would never see him again because "the must be in the bad graces of British immigration officials."

They met in 1944 when Boyes was here in a British cruiser. After the war he deserted the Marines to stow away on a ship bound for Halifax but was caught and punished. Another time he stowed away but the ship ended up in an Egyptian port.

In his fifth attempt, he hid on the Queen Elizabeth last spring but was captured and turned over to authorities in New York.

First Slavery Conviction In U. S. Since 1880

SAN DIEGO, Calif., July 20 — (AP) — A Federal Court jury convicted Mrs. Elizabeth Ingalls, 62, of slavery Saturday night but was dismissed six hours later after reporting failure to reach a verdict in the case of her husband, Alfred Wesley Ingalls, 64.

Mrs. Ingalls was convicted of enslaving Doris Jones, Negro maid, over a period of nearly 40 years in violation of the 18th amendment to the United States constitution.

Mrs. Ingalls was placed in the county jail despite an impassioned plea by her husband that "it will mean her death" pending her sentence set for July 20. The maximum penalty is a five years in prison, a \$5,000 fine, or both.

The trial, which lasted four weeks, was the first outright slavery case tried under the 18th amendment since 1860.

Ingalls remained at liberty on \$2,500 bail. Miss Jones, 58, meanwhile was on her way to St. Louis, Mo., to make her husband a mother after declaring she never expected to see the Ingalls again.

She testified during the trial that she felt that the "owed her life" to Mrs. Ingalls because of an affair of nearly 40 years ago with her mistress' first husband, Walter Harnish of Washington, D.C.

The prosecution contended that Mrs. Ingalls "never allowed Doris to forget" that affair and that she and her husband used it to reduce the maid to slavery under threats of jail and hell.

"Terrific" Sale Of World Bank Bonds

NEW YORK, July 20 — (AP) — The world bank added a new chapter to the history of international finance last week with the public sale of \$250,000,000 of its bonds.

The response of investors, said a spokesman for the bank, was "terrific." On Tuesday the bank climaxed weeks of intensive preparation by distribution to some 1,000 dealers throughout the United States of \$150,000,000 of 25-year bonds with a three-per-cent coupon and \$100,000,000 of 10-year bonds with a 2-1/4 per-cent coupon.

At noon the same day, marketing director E. F. Dunster announced heavy over-subscription.

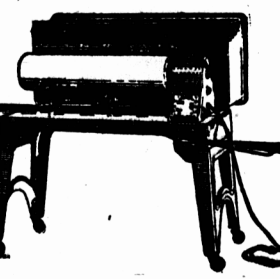
