Harvesting Is Delayed By Heavy Rainfall

Heavy rainfall yesterday delayed harvesting operations in Prince Edward Island although farmers believe that the crop is slightly 90 per cent of cereal crops had been out and farmers everywhere were rushing operations to house the grain when rain stopped work yesterday afternoon.

At 8 o'clock last night 48 inches of rain had been recorded for the day at the Charlottetown Experimental Station. Mr. Warren Burns, meteorologist, said wind from the south east had averaged 26 miles per hour with gusts at times reaching 32 m.p.h., it was said.

A reduction of 10 to 15 per cent in the expected yield of tubers it was estimated would result from damage to plants by late heavy rain. Mr. J. A. Clark, superintendent of the Charlottetown Experimental Station said last night. Rainfall had delayed harvesting operations, the Experimental Station head continued. Oat and barley yields above average while rust had greatly reduced wheat yield and late blight might cause rot in the potato crop. Both corn and vegetable are very promising and the yields above average. Pastures have continued excellent throughout the year. Apples are sizing up well and the yield is likely to be of excellent quality." Dr. Clark declared.

The Staff of the Experimental station, he remarked, appreciate the co-operation given by police and citizens in stopping pilfering from the experimental orchard and plots. In the past valuable data being secured by special experiment had been lost by destruction of crops which were of little value to the thieves but of great importance and interest to horticulturists and farmers. An appeal was made to the public to assist those engaged in such valuable work by explaining its importance to children.

WELLINGTON, N. Z.—Although he has two wooden legs, Rex Hargreaves, of the Westown (New Plymouth) troop of Boy Scouts, will be one of the New Plymouth scouts to attend the jamboree at Sydney. It is regarded as a fitting reward for the remarkable spirit he has shown in spite of his great handicap.

Early in his life Rex, through an accident, lost both his legs and had to be fitted with artificial limbs. In spite of his disability he determined to be no other boys at school and in the Scouts he has joined in all the activities of his school fellows. He plays football, swims, competes in running events and has often been climbing trees. He also rides a bicycle. He is an object of wonderment to all his friends.

The movement to send him away with the party to Sydney originated from a scoutmaster, Mr. Hedges, who is in charge of the Westown troop, and was assisted by the Rev. F. Hart, of the New Plymouth Rotary Club granted a sum of money that made the trip a certainty. Speculation Re Change In Euler's Plans

OTTAWA, Sept. 1—Sudden cancellation of the proposed continental European visit of Hon. W. D. Euler, Minister of Trade and Commerce, and his return from England to Canada by boat sailing Saturday has led to much speculation on Parliament Hill.

A number of reasons are advanced to account for Mr. Euler's decision not to visit Germany, Italy or Czechoslovakia at this time one being that his presence is desired in Ottawa because of near completion of the new Canada-United States trade treaty, others being the disturbed state of affairs in Europe.

CROP PROSPECTS GOOD

SAYS C. N. R. OFFICIAL

SASKATOON, Sask., Sept. 1—J. Hungerford, chairman and president of Canadian National Railways, and president of Trans-Canada Air Lines, put in a busy day in the central Saskatchewan area on arrival here from Calgary yesterday, accompanied by C. H. Read of Amherst, N. S., B. L. Daly of Winnipeg and R. J. Moffat of Bradwell, Sask. Mr. Moffat is assistant to the president; A. E. Warren, vice president western region, and H. A. Dixon, chief engineer, Mr. Hungerford put in a busy morning inspecting the local terminals and properties. Today, at Regina, the official party will look over the company properties and a close inspection will be made of the Trans-Canada Air Lines hangar and property at the air field. It is expected Mr. Hungerford and party will arrive in Winnipeg on Saturday morning.

Throughout the trip through Alberta and so far in Saskatchewan, Mr. Hungerford has expressed great satisfaction at the crop prospects. Harvesting is proceeding at a steady pace and generally speaking it looks like a particularly busy time for the railroads to handle the various shipping points. "I feel particularly pleased at what we have seen so far, especially in those areas that were unfortunately so dried out or my last few visits," declared Mr. Hungerford.
