Canadian Wheat Ousts Russian

OTTAWA, Nov. 30.—Canada has replaced Russia as the dominant exporter of wheat to the United Kingdom. The October trade and navigation report of the United Kingdom received here today, shows this country occupied almost exactly the same position in the United Kingdom market as Russia occupied in October, 1931. Of a total importation of 19,632,648 bushels in October, 1932, Canada supplied 11,204,629 bushels, or 57.2 per cent., while Russia supplied 3,061,974 bushels, or 15.6 per cent. In October, 1931, of a total importation of 27,875,542 bushels, Russia supplied 11,697,143 bushels, or 43.3 per cent., and Canada 3,429,707 bushels, or 12.4 per cent. British import figures for the first ten months of the year show Canada has moved up from second place in 1931 to first place among the supplying countries. Russia dropped from first place to fifth.

Suffers Injury

SYDNEY, Nov. 30.—Friends in the city of Andy Campbell, one time member of the city police force and manager of the Ashby hockey team, will be sorry to learn that he is a patient in the Polytechnic Hospital, New York, with severe feet injuries, sustained when he fell off a building to the ground below, a distance of forty-eight feet. The accident occurred a week or so ago, and his condition continues to remain satisfactory, according to word received by friends here.

Rich Beet Crop In South Alta.

RAYMOND, Alta., Nov. 30.—Southern Alberta farmers will be about \$1,000,000 richer from their sugar beet crop this year. Far greater than ever estimated the crop this season will produce about 150,000 tons of beets, farmers say, which are averaging 17.04 sugar. Slicing of beets is continuing 24 hours a day with an average of 1,200 tons prepared daily—and growers are receiving a "fairly good price" for their product.

EXPLOSIONS ROCK MONTREAL SECTION

Sewer And Gas Mains In North End Explode Causing Huge Property Damage And Terrorizing Thousands Of Residents—No Lives As Yet Reported Lost.

MONTREAL, Nov. 30.—Firemen and rescue gangs were frantically searching the flaming ruins of a three storey building here tonight, for possible victims of a disastrous series of explosions in sewer and gas mains in the north end of Montreal. From two to twelve persons were feared caught in the debris of the building which caught fire as a result of the explosions. Sixteen people are known to have lived in the block and only four have been definitely accounted for.

Miles of Sewer Damaged

Miles of sewer were damaged and miles of street paving torn up in area 10 blocks long by eight blocks wide. The district affected is bounded by Dufferin Street, St. Lawrence Boulevard, Jean Talon street and St. Hubert Street. Money estimates could not be gauged early but the disaster meant work for thousands of unemployed in effecting repairs.

France Will Insist Payment Must Be Postponed

New War Debt Memorandum Sets Forth Difficulty Of Meeting December Instalment.

50 Countries Connected By Cable With Can.

STARVATION FACES GEESE AND BRANT

Disease Which Has Attacked Eel Grass Along Atlantic Coast Deprives Canadian Game Of Chief Food.

NEW YORK, Nov. 30.—Starvation faces Canadian geese and brant, the American game conference was told today, as a result of a disease which had attacked eel grass along the Atlantic coast. A paper written by Harrison F. Lewis, chief migratory bird officer of the Dominion Department of the Interior, and read before the conference by Hayes Lloyd, supervisor of wild life of the same department, described the situation. The paper said the eel grass, chief food of the geese and brant, has been attacked by an organism not yet isolated, but believed to have come from the tropics by way of the gulf stream.
