..ODDFELLOWS CELEBRATE AT MONTAGUE—The Oddfellows of the Hillside Lodge at Montague held their annual parade and service on Sunday April 24. The service was held in the United Church with the Rev. D. M. Sinclair, pastor of the Valleyfield United Church officiating. A large number turned out to attend the service and view the parade which started at the Lodge and marched to the church, marshalled by Brother Robert Stewart. Mr. Sinclair took his text from Jeremiah 31, verse 21, "Set thee up waymarks, make thee high leaps: set thine heart toward the highway even the way which thou wentest: turn again to these thy cities. This sermon on the Highway of Life was one of the best ever heard at Montague and few there were who did not leave the church with a greater desire for fellowship with those along the Highway. Following is a brief outline of Mr. Sinclair's sermon—The Highway of Life, Jeremiah 31: 21. In ancient times the highways were the very arteries along which the life of nations ran. The highway became synonymous with commerce, trade and wealth. In modern times though the highway has lost much of its thrill and romance, it still has its attraction. Life is compared with a journey. Along the ways are many inns that maintain interest in the travelling. Religion offers many inns along the way and a resting place at the journey's end. There is the religious ministry of nature which is an inn of beauty. There is the wayside inn of art which has a religious value and significance. There is the inn of knowledge to quicken Life's interests. But the best inn by the side of the road, the place where we come nearest to God, is in human life. We live among people very much like ourselves and from them we learn the great lessons of life. We have been speaking of some of the joys that come to us as we go along the highway, but let us not forget that there are grave dangers lurking along the highway of life. When Jesus told the story of the Good Samaritan He gave us a vivid picture of certain permanent types that travel the highway still. There is the victim who foolishly sets out along over a dangerous road. Then all the robbers, many of whom are not caught, who are carrying on their insidious work; robbers of purity of self-respect, of honesty. There are the priests and Levites who are indifferent to the crying social needs of our time. There is the Good Samaritan who ministers to the weak and wounded. As a great brotherhood it is the obvious duty of Oddfellows to play the Good Samaritan in life. But it is not also your duty to make the inns more attractive and the highway safe. Get rid of the robbers and the Good Samaritan will have less of that sort of work to do. Let your heart be the highway. Do not travel it alone. It is dangerous. The death at Moncton on April 24 at 10 p.m. at the family home, 92 Highfield street, of Mrs. Matilda Davies, beloved wife of Mr. William A. Davies, retired superintendent of water services on the Canadian National Railways, removed a most estimable and highly respected citizen.

The late Mrs. Davies was a native of Penobscot, Kings County, N. B., and was 84 years of age. She was before her marriage, in 1875, Miss Matilda MacLeod, daughter of the late Alexander and Maria (Freeze) MacLeod, of that place. For the last 54 years she resided in Moncton. She was a lady of refinement and one who devoted herself most loyally to her home. She was imbued with high Christian principles and a charitable disposition and her passing will be learned with sincere regret.

Besides her husband, the late Mrs. Davies leaves to mourn two daughters, Miss Elizabeth Davies, of the C. N. R. general offices staff, and Miss Maria Davies, at home; also one sister, Mrs. A. D. Freeze of Penobscot, and two brothers, Mr. Byron MacLeod, of Penobscot, and Mr. F. M. MacLeod, barrister, of Vancouver, B. C., also survive. The late Mr. William E. Davies, of Montreal, a well known representative of a large wholesale drygoods firm, who travelled the Maritimes for many years and who passed away about three years ago, was a son.

The funeral will be held on Wednesday afternoon, the hour of service to be announced later. (Mrs. Davies was a sister-in-law of the late J. J. Davies of Charlottetown).
