A lady and gentleman of this city, on the evening of the first of this month shortly after six o'clock noticed a very large meteor sweeping across the heavens from north to south. Their observation is confirmed by the following report which is clipped from the "New York Times" of the 2nd inst: "A meteor of majestic proportions swept the westerly sky at almost precisely 6.30 o'clock last night. To onlookers it appeared larger and brighter than an arc light seen a block away, but was of a more bluish hue. The heavenly visitor left a trail of sparks along its whole course as it seemed to travel from due north to due south, and the apparent slowness of its movement greatly impressed those who were fortunate enough to see it. 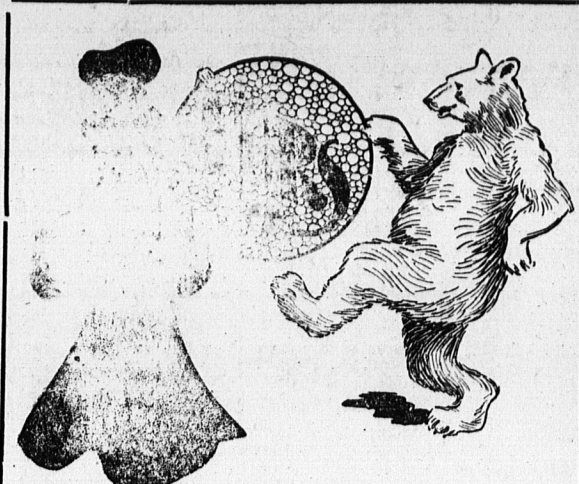
