British Labor Speaks

A plain, outspoken speech on the position of British labor after the war was made recently by J. H. Thomas, M. P., secretary of the Amalgamated Society of Railway Servants, at a luncheon given by the Aldwych Club. He said: "The moment there are peace negotiations war work will cease, and when the men who for three years will ask if they have to stand in queue waiting for jobs."

"It is this what we have been fighting for? Because if it is we will have another scrap to alter it. "The problem might be solved if every controlled establishment should be in position immediately the order to cease making shells is given, to turn its attention to the manufacture of useful things. "Then what is to be or army of the future. If an effort is made to give us conscription I for one, and I think the great masses of the working people, will feel that our sacrifices have been in vain; for in their endeavor to destroy German militarism they will have perpetuated militarism in this country."

PARCELS ARE WELCOME The following letter was received by Mrs. Romanus McDougall, Grand River, Lot 14, from her nephew, Pte. Neil A. McDougall, 24th Battalion Royal Highland Canadians, France. This gallant young man enlisted in the 16th when scarcely eighteen years of age. He was wounded at Vimy Ridge April 9th and returned to the trenches last August, where he has since seen some strenuous fighting.

Somewhere in France Jan. 6, 1918 Dear Auntie:—Something tells me that I have not answered your last letter and parcel which I received some time ago. If I have it is all right if I have not it is "better late than never." I thank you very much for the parcel. Well dear Auntie, how is everything around home. No doubt you are having very cold weather now. We had a splendid autumn, but now the weather is not good at all. I received a parcel from a Miss Ladd in Alberta, where James boarded it was a beauty. It was very thoughtful of her. She must have got my address through James. I also had a letter from Ada a few days ago. She is fine.

It was a very strange thing that Mr. Angus McLean received no telegram informing them of Jimmie's death. I had written them, but I guess they never received my letter. I received Mamma's parcel not long ago. I was wishing for gloves and got my wish when I received your parcel. The gloves were great. It is hard to get gloves in this country. I had a field card from Neil James not long ago I have not seen him yet. Well Auntie I think it is about time I was bringing this letter to a close. With love to Uncle and yourself. COUPLE BROTHERS GOING OVERSEAS WITH THE 249TH George and Leslie Nisbet, two brothers, are the first to enlist in the Maine contingent of the 249th Battalion of Canadians now stationed at Quebec, waiting for the quota of Maine men to fill up the ranks before starting for overseas duty. George and Leslie Nisbet came to Portland from Lily Bay, 78 miles north of Greenville, to enlist in this contingent of Canadian and British subjects with war reports from Maine in the 24th Battalion. Both men are big huskies and have been working in the woods for sometime, being in splendid physical condition for army service. The Nisbet brothers are two of a family of nine sons of Mr. and Mrs. Nisbet of Prince Edward Island. A brother Thomas Nisbet is now somewhere in France with a Canadian regiment, and both George and Leslie expect to meet him on the firing line. A brother, Alex. Nesbit, resides at 40 Pembroke Street, this City. The recruiting office here will soon save the assistance of Capt. Ball and a corps of non-commissioned officers when a campaign will be conducted in this City to raise the necessary quota for the Maine contingent of the 249th Canadian Overseas Battalion. The Nesbit brothers leave tonight for the front.
