AN INSTRUCTIVE LECTURE.—At St. Dunstan's University last Wednesday evening, Mr. Justice Arsenault, a worthy son of that institution, delivered a lecture before the assembled body of students on "Law, its Making and its Application." This wide and comprehensive subject was discussed in a brief, humorous, and exhaustive manner, peculiar to the distinguished lecturer. First he briefly outlined the history of law. In this phase, he sketched for his audience the growth of law from God's injunction to Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden to the latest legislation of the present day. In the second part of his speech, he gave the different divisions into which law resolves itself to-day, and so simplified many intricate, technical terms, that they were easily understood by all. Judge Arsenault was accompanied on his visit by two legal friends Messrs. G. S. Inman and C. G. Duffy. These two gentlemen, when called upon, supplemented the Judge's remarks with humorous instances of the superstitious beliefs which people hold concerning the legal profession and its members. Rev. Dr. McLellan, Rector of the University then thanked the visitors and invited them to return again within the scholastic year. A vote of thanks to the learned lecturer was moved in a few fitting words by Mr. St. Clair Trainer and ably seconded by Mr. Leo Doyle. The meeting was ably presided over by Mr. John Cass. An appropriate musical program was rendered by the College orchestra. The meeting was closed with the singing of the National Anthem.

SEATTLE.—The following a portion of a letter received by The Guardian from Rev J E O'Brien, Holy Family Parish, Kirkland, Seattle, Wash, formerly of Fort Augustus, who visited the island last summer will be of interest to readers: "I am now located in one of Seattle's beautiful suburban towns Kirkland, having charge of a very large and beautiful church and parish, called the Holy Family Church corner Jersey and Lincoln Streets. Kirkland is situated on the beautiful waters of Lake Washington, which lake the city of Seattle completely encircles. The lake is sixty miles in circumference. My church and residence is on the Seattle Lake. Washington Boulevard is sixty-two miles of a solid concrete driveway, thirty feet wide. The city of Seattle is about 400,000 in population, when I came here twenty-five years ago it was 62,000. Today is the 7th of December and the roses are blooming in our gardens."

INSPECTING CONTEST POULTRY.—Messrs J G Morgan and Fred Elford, government poultry inspectors for all the egg laying contests which are being conducted throughout Canada, arrived in the city Wednesday evening with Superintendent J A Clark, of the Experimental Station on return from the Amherst Fair. Mr Elford informs the Guardian that the contest birds here are locking in very good condition but are late in laying. This applies also to other provinces this year on account of the backward spring. Early pullets are not so numerous as in other years. Interest in the egg laying contest is increasing although this is not perhaps so evident on the island as elsewhere. The contests are valuable in creating an interest in actual production as they emphasize the necessity of breeding poultry for production and not for show purposes. Messrs Morgan and Elford left this morning for Kentville, N. S. They have already covered the Western provinces and their present tour is confined to the Maritime Provinces and Quebec.
