### THE STATION SITE.

The strong protest adopted by the Council of the Board of Trade against the unwarrantable proposal to locate the new railway station east of Hillsboro street was a timely action taken as soon as possible after the intention of the railway authorities became publicly known. This attempt to defeat the well-understood wishes of the people becomes the more offensive when it is seen to bear all the earmarks of a cut and dried plan long since determined upon but purposely concealed until after the election.

No Government would have ventured to make a location of the depot at the place now proposed if the people were yet to record their votes, and the fact that it is now proposed to adopt the Hillsboro Street site can only be construed as a flagrant disregard of the wishes of our citizens. It serves to recall how the popular will was disregarded and the convenience of the town and country needlessly sacrificed by the present location of the Hillsboro bridge.

Complaints of the unhealthfulness of the old station have been made by all the officials employed there from the Superintendent down, and the health authorities have condemned it as impossible to be made healthy because the soil beneath it is constantly saturated. The same objection applies with full force to the site east of Hillsboro street. It was formerly half bog, half pond, and one member of the Board of Trade states that he has repeatedly skated over it.

Constant complaints have been made by those who live there of water in their cellars. And it is in such a locality as this that it is now proposed to erect a new and costly building! There is plenty of solid room between Prince and Great George streets, or between Great George and Queen streets, centrally located to accommodate the business community, and affording a healthful as well as convenient location, but to please one or two interested parties we must needs go to the extreme eastern margin of the city to locate the station on a bog!

It was complained by some that if the station were located on George street the trains would extend across Prince street and passengers would have to walk from Prince to George. Exactly the same objection applies to the location at Hillsboro street as the longer trains will then extend eastward across Weymouth and passengers will have to get off the cars at the latter street, fully as far east as the present station. But if nothing but the Eastern Bog will do for a location no doubt some flimsy excuse will be framed.

To locate the station on the bog the authorities seem willing to reject the advice of the Board of Trade unanimously expressed, the unanimous resolve of the City Council, and the resolution adopted by a public meeting with equal unanimity, all of which were endorsed by the three daily newspapers of Charlottetown. We refuse to believe that this stupid decision against the well understood wishes of the people can be carried out. A delegation from the Board of Trade will reach Ottawa early in the new year and will no doubt strongly present the wishes of our citizens and the facts which so forcibly condemn the eastern bog site for which a plan has been formulated.

Sir Conan Doyle is puzzled to know why it is that the states of South California and Georgia should have more homicides yearly than the entire British Empire and also to know why during the period of the war in South Africa there were 31,000 homicides in the United States while the British losses in the war were but 22,000. ### JAPAN'S NAVAL PROBLEM.

The Roman Senator who rose in his place in the chamber day after day to repeat that 'Carthage must be destroyed' expressed the attitude of Japan toward the fleet that Rojstvensky is now steaming toward Vladivostok. The Baltic fleet must be destroyed. Japan has for that matter already destroyed a stronger Russian fleet at and beyond Port Arthur. She must at all cost destroy the Baltic fleet. The mere approach of these hostile ships will threaten Japan's overseas movements of transports and supplies. And if only half the Baltic fleet is destroyed at the expense of half the Japanese fleet then in the opinion of an English naval expert Japan has lost the war. It is also pointed out that Admiral Togo cannot wait at Port Arthur for his enemy. Rojstvensky is not making for Port Arthur but for Vladivostok, to join the Russian cruisers there. True, that harbor is frozen up, but an ice-breaker provides the means for the cruisers to come out or for the Baltic fleet to go in.

Togo must therefore find the Russian Baltic fleet and cripple or destroy it before the junction is effected. It must be destroyed at once and so thoroughly that its remaining portion is not enough, combined with the ships at Vladivostok to make successful raids upon the transport service or the commerce of Japan. Whether it will be so destroyed only time can show, but if it is not it must go ill with Japan's campaign on the mainland. In the new emergency which is approaching the issue of the war is staked upon the successful outcome of a naval battle, or of several battles, in which again, as at the beginning of the war, Russia will be superior in heavy ships and guns. For Togo has but four battleships and six first-class cruisers. With these he has three four superb new battleships and three others less efficient, of his enemy, with a considerable squadron of cruisers, some of which are very fast, but only two of which equal Togo's six in their weight of armour. The coming shock of naval battle may yet prove to be the supreme crisis of the war.

The Montreal Witness mentions that although Hon. A. G. Blair and David Russell both threatened to bring libel suits against certain newspapers ament the exposure of the purchase of La Presse and kindred matters, no such libel suits have yet been entered.

A rumor was in circulation yesterday that certain special votes of prominent persons in Summerside for Conservative candidates in the Fort Augustus district are missing. It is a fact that no special votes from Prince County for Conservative candidates in Fort Augustus were forthcoming when the packets of special votes were opened. We have no means of verifying the rumor referred to and give it only for what it is worth.

Referring to the tie vote between Premier Peters and Mr. McEwen in St. Peters district The Examiner is in error in stating that this is the first case of the kind occurring here. In the provincial election of 1880 in the Second District of Queens a tie occurred between Joseph Wise and Donald McKay, each of whom received 952 votes. A special return was made by Returning Officer C. E. McKinnon, but before the House met the seat was awarded to Mr. Wise by Judge Hensley after a scrutiny.
