#### INSINCERITY OF MCKENZIE KING BARED

Premier Bennett In Spirited Address Before Women's Conservative Ass'n.

OTTAWA, Dec. 18.—If the people of Canada could be fully informed of the true conditions he had no apprehensions over the outcome of the next general election, Prime Minister R. B. Bennett declared here today. Addressing a luncheon meeting of the Ottawa Women's Conservative Association Mr. Bennett declared that the only policy of his opponents was to oppose every act of the government. He made pointed references to Liberal opposition to preferential trade pacts and to what he described as the recent "re-creation" of Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Liberal leader.

#### JAPAN MOVES TO ABROGATE NAVAL TREATY

Step Regarded as Most Significant The Empire Has Taken Since the Great War.

TOKYO, Dec. 18.—(Wednesday) The Japanese Privy Council, highest consultative body of the realm, today unanimously advised Emperor Hirohito to abrogate the Washington Treaty of 1922. Based upon the report of its investigating committee, the council's recommendation to the emperor was made after short ceremonial deliberations in the Imperial Palace. Many thoughtful Japanese leaders considered the step, representing virtual confirmation of a decision arrived at long before-hand, as the most significant the Empire has taken since the Great War.

#### 23 SURRENDER VOLUNTARILY

MONTREAL, Dec. 18.—Out of a total of 61 persons requested by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police to surrender voluntarily on charges of being parties to a \$500,000 liquor-smuggling conspiracy, 23 had tonight accepted the invitation and been received at the court of Chief Judge Gustave Perrault.

#### Improvement In Lumber Industry

MONTREAL, Dec. 18.—A rosy picture of the Dominion's lumber industry with particular reference to the boom in the export of Eastern Canadian lumber to the United Kingdom, was painted today at the annual meeting of the Montreal Lumber Association (an adjunct of the Montreal Board of Trade) by Claude Villiers, president. The industry, Mr. Villiers stated, has already commenced a return to more prosperous conditions. Low mark of the depression having occurred in February last. A remarkable improvement was noted since with a heavy demand for export. Mill stocks were at as low a point as they have been for many years.

#### POTATO MARKETING SCHEME NOW UNDER FINAL CONSIDERATION

Dominion Board's Decision Now Being Awaited. Powers Given Under Scheme Are Outlined.

OTTAWA, Dec. 18.—Planned by its sponsors as the salvation of the industry, decision was reserved by the Dominion Marketing Board today on the scheme of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and Ontario producers and dealers to regulate the marketing of potatoes in these provinces. With representatives of the Departments of Agriculture for New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Ontario lending their support, advocates of the plan placed their case before Chairman G. H. S. Barton and his colleagues. The hearing was behind closed doors. The setting up of a body to be known as the Eastern Canada Potato Marketing Board was the highlight of the proposal. With a personnel of nine, each of the four provinces would have two representatives on the board. L. F. Burrows, secretary of the Canadian Horticultural Council, would be chairman.

BOARD S. S. EUROPE AT SEA, Dec. 18.—Sixteen men were successfully taken off the stricken Norwegian freighter Sisto tonight and transferred in tossing seas to the liner New York.  
The Sisto was left in a sinking condition, with one feeble light burning.  
The liner Europa, which with the New York had been standing by in the storm-tossed mid-Atlantic, proceeded to its port of destination, elated over the victory.

#### LIBERALS' DISPUTE MAY REACH COURTS

Gouin Group Members Consider Injunction If Ousted From Club.  
MONTREAL, Dec. 18.—An injunction against Montreal's Reform Club—metropolitan stronghold of Liberalism—to bring before a justice of the peace the task of ruling as to when a Liberal is not a Liberal, is threatened by L'Action Libérale Nationale in the event of the club ousting its group on the grounds that one cannot remain a true Liberal and at the same time, policies of the Liberal Government of the Province of Quebec.  
The injunction would stay ouster proceedings until court defines just what constitutes a true Liberal—within the political sense of the word. The point at issue is as to whether or not the insurgent group's members can be styled "Liberals" when they openly support the Federal party under Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, and openly criticize Premier L. A. Taschereau, K.C., and the provincial Liberal Government.  
It was some weeks ago that news of a "purge" within the provincial Liberal party broke, it being reported that leaders of L'Action Libérale Nationale—notably Paul Gouin, F. A. Monk, Jean Martineau, K.C., Gaixie Cormier, Hector Langevin and Roger Oulmet—would shortly have their choice as to whether or not they would resume their loyalty to the head of the party in Quebec who is Premier Taschereau, or whether they should step out of the club.  
Pierre Casgrain, K.C., M.P., president of the Reform Club, had adamantly in his insistence that the question of throwing out "rebels" was never discussed at any meeting of the board, but from other sources, it was learned yesterday that a group of members—"true Liberals"—were ready to make a move, holding that action must be taken "now or never."
