Braves Sweep Twin Bill With Pittsburgh

(By The Canadian Press)

The top-place Boston Braves swept a National League double-header from Pittsburgh Sunday, taking the opener 10-2 and the nightcap 3-1.

Brooklyn, under new manager Burt Shotton, steamrollered St. Louis Cardinals 13-4 after losing the opener 6-3 in 11 innings with Terry Moore breaking up the game with a three-run homer.

Chicago split with Philadelphia, winning the opener 3-2 and losing the nightcap 6-4.

Cincinnati split with New York, the Reds winning 3-0 on Ken Raffensberger's second successive shutout in the opener. The Giants took the second game 8-2 with Clint Hartung and Clem Driess-crowd limiting Cincinnati to six hits.

Ralph Kiner of Pittsburgh hit his 26th home run of the season and his 100th of his major league career in the ninth inning of the second game against the Braves to give the Buccos their only run.

Nelson Potter, former American leaguer, won his first start in the senior circuit when he held the Pirates to seven hits in the opener.

Another ex-American leaguer, Jeff Heath, was the big gun in the Boston attack, slamming out a home run with the bases loaded, a double and two singles.

The Dodgers scored all their 13 runs in the first two innings of the second contest. The Cards used six pitchers.

The Dodgers' 13 hits included a brace of doubles by both Pee-wee Reese and George Shuba.

Shuba batted in three runs and Roy Campanella, formerly with Montreal Royals, also accounted for three. Al Papsal and Red Munger stopped the Dodgers cold after their early rampage.

Moore's blow supplied a thrilling climax to the bitterly-contested first contest. It came with two out and found Musial and Enos Slaughter on base. Moore had entered the game as a pinch-runner the inning before.

The bespectacled Lanthier and his burly partner today led Rochon and Buser 2-1 in sets and 8-7 in games when a cloudburst chased the players from the court, drenching some 800 fans. The weather remained threatening and it appeared unlikely the mixed doubles final would be played.

Buser's effective overhead smashes at the net enabled Rochon to carry most of his services but the situation became reversed as Rochon moved to the net on Buser's service.

PITTSBURGH, July 18 — (AP) — Leo Durocher, new manager of New York Giants, told newspaper men Saturday night: "I was asked to resign as manager of Brooklyn."

Asked if Branch Rickey, owner of the Dodgers, had asked him to quit, Leo replied: "No, Mr. Rickey didn't actually ask me. He sent Harold Parrott (secretary of the Dodgers) to ask me."

When asked if he and Rickey are still friendly, Leo declared: "I don't have anything else to say. You've got the story—I was asked to resign and that's that."

SPECIAL PRIZES

The MACDONALD TOBACCO COMPANY OF MONTREAL has donated a beautiful Trophy, known as the British Consols Trophy which will be awarded to the Driver scoring the most points during the meeting. First place counts five points, second place three points, third place two points and fourth place one point.

\$20. will be given the driver driving the fastest heat trotted during the meet and \$20. to the driver driving the fastest heat paced during the meet.

\$10. will be given the caretaker of the horse trotting the fastest heat and \$10 to the caretaker of the horse pacing the fastest heat.

\$10. will be given to winning driver of each race.

\$5. will be given to the caretaker of each horse winning a race in the trotting and pacing classes during the meet.

\$50. will be given to the owner of the horse that beats the track pacing record of 2:05 1/2, except as provided for below. \$50. to the owner of the horse that beats the track trotting record of 2:07 1/2, except as provided for below. In case two horses beat the above records then the awards go to the fastest horse. If two horses tie for the awards the money will be divided equally.

GENERAL CONDITIONS

(ALL RACES MILE HEATS)

Horsemen by wiring at our expense notifying us of their arrival will be met at the train and their baggage transferred to the grounds without cost to them, also taken away without cost to them. Every effort will be made to make the horsemen's stay pleasant and send them away feeling that they have been well treated.

All races to be raced on three heat plan: (Except should there be 12 to 17 starters in any one class. The class will be divided and raced under the dash system—two dashes for each division with a purse of \$200.00 for each dash. Money division 40-30-18-12. If 18 or more starters they will be raced in 3 divisions.) 10 per cent of each purse will be awarded to the winner. The remainder will be divided into three equal parts, one part to be raced for each heat. In the event of there being three heat winners they shall have a fourth heat to determine the winner. Any horse winning the first two heats in any race shall relinquish pole position and assume last scoring position. Said horse must not lay up, but try for the heat. Drivers obviously laying a horse up are liable to penalties.

All purses divided 40, 30, 18, and 12 per cent. Entry fee 3 per cent. No deductions from money winners.

Six horses to enter and four to start.

Rights reserved to change program, reject any entry or if entry appears to lay over the field to the extent that there is not in the opinion of the management, sufficient competition, then the said entry may be transferred to a faster class or entry fee refunded, bar any driver and to declare race off on account of bad weather, or failing to obtain satisfactory number of entries or starters to transfer horses to another class to which they are eligible, re-open or substitute another without advertising, or alter or extend racing dates or extend credit.

Purse money will not be paid to anyone except owner unless an order from owner authorizing same is presented.

Additional entries of an individual ownership may be made in any class by the payment of 1 per cent on closing date but entries of separate ownership, although in the same stable must pay installment in full.

Two entries of the same ownership may start in the same race, providing the full 3 per cent is paid on each starter, the drivers having the approval of the judges.

All horses with names of drivers will be given in at Judge's Stand at 10 o'clock a. m., the day prior to the race, when positions will be drawn to enable us to print score cards with actual starters.

Eligibility based on U. S. T. A. money winning classification.

Rights reserved to give or extend credit for entries or other purposes. Horses entered and occupying stalls but not taking part in races will be held for entrance fee.

The Exhibition Association assumes no responsibility or fire or any accident or damage to any person or property during this meeting, and this understanding is part of this contract. Owners must assume any damage to property or persons caused by drivers, attendants or horse.

Hay, straw and stabling free.

Races called at 1:30 P.M. to start at sharp 1:45 P.M. Horses not appearing at that time may be disqualified.

U.S.T.A. rules to govern except where they conflict with these conditions. Be sure and bring your eligibility certificate and driver's license. Photo Finish Camera will be used to assist the Judges in placing the horses. If through failure of the camera, or for any reason a picture is not obtained, the decision of the Judges shall be final. Starting Gate.

THE OFFICIALS

The officials will be selected for their experience and reliability and will be instructed to carry out the rules firmly and fairly. All purse money will be paid immediately after the race and horsemen are asked to get same from Secretary before leaving.
