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Possible Hitch In Prohibition Act

Special to the Guardian. OTTAWA, Dec. 3.—There is now every likelihood that Nova Scotia, Saskatchewan, Alberta and Manitoba will become dry towards the end of January. Since the plebiscites on importation were taken, a serious legal situation which has arisen. The point was whether Government vendors could be properly classed as holding licenses. Action to prohibit importation would be taken under one of the Temperance Act; if under another clause and between the two there is a difference of at least thirty days in the period within which liquor may still be imported for personal use.

More Exemptions From Sales Tax

OTTAWA, Dec. 3.—More articles have been added to those free from Sales Tax, among them being bread, yeast, salt, malted foods for infants, use, real estate and building, home-cooked meats, not canned, gluten flour, rolled wheat, poultry feed, stearine oil, cotton seed oil, and corn oil when used solely in the manufacture of oleomargarine or any substitute for butter or as a substitute for lard for the production of cotton lard, tallow for use solely for lard, jellies, marmalade and preserves, best manila, used only in the manufacture of rope for holding traps in lobster fisheries, articles imported for use of the Government.

(Special to the Guardian.) NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—Gold valued at \$5,000,000 arrived here today on the steamer Saxonia, consigned to J. P. Morgan and Co. from the British Treasury. The money will be used to meet current maturity of the British Govt. in the United States.

Hon. G. H. Ferguson Conservative Leader By Big Majority

TORONTO, Dec. 3.—Hon. G. H. Ferguson was elected leader of the Liberal-Conservative party at yesterday afternoon session of the convention in Massey Hall. The defeated candidates, Brigadier Gen. Arthur E. Ross of Kingston, and Hon. George H. Henry of East York, asked that the meeting make its decision unanimously in favor of the member for Granville. On the first ballot, 1,664 votes had been cast and Mr. Ferguson obtained more of these than the other two contestants combined.

Possible Changes In League Covenant

(Special to the Guardian.) GENEVA, Dec. 3.—Presentation and adoption of a resolution eliminating article ten from the covenant of the League of Nations before the end of the present session of the Assembly, would occasion no surprise here. Assertions were made that yesterday's decision of the committee on the admission of New States, which held in effect that the article does not guarantee the territorial integrity of any new member of the League, represented the view of a majority of the delegates at the present meeting. This interpretation and the postponement and consideration of certain changes in the covenant were his principal topics of conversation here today. These changes which were proposed by the Scandinavian countries were made in no-wise to prevent consideration at this session of any other amendments. Hon. N. W. Rowell brought this out clearly by questioning Mr. Balfour.

Implicating Documents Made Public

(Special to the Guardian.) LONDON, Dec. 3.—Premier George stated in the Commons yesterday that documents found in possession of Eamon De Valera when he was arrested in May, 1918, would be included in those which the Government were about to make public. These documents, asserted the Premier, implicated the Irish Republican Army in a German conspiracy.

Home Rule Bill Will Probably Pass

LONDON, Dec. 2.—There appeared to be a prospect today that the Irish Home Rule Bill would go through the committee stage in the House of Lords without serious amendment. The Lords today rejected Lord Middleton's amendment which would have had the effect of creating one parliament for Southern Ireland and leaving the six Ulster Counties under the Imperial Parliament. The Government rejected the amendment on the ground that it struck at the whole framework of the Bill and the amendment was defeated by a vote of 111 to 53.

D'Annunzio Seized British Steamer

TRIESTE, Dec. 2.—The British steamer Narenta, which was captured yesterday by D'Annunzio's Arditi near Pola, has been ordered to be taken to Fiume. The steamer, which is loaded with flour and fodder will be put into service by D'Annunzio for the conveyance of troops and ammunition to the Island of Veglia. The Narenta was bound from Pola to the Island of Lussin when she was captured by D'Annunzio's men. Soldiers of the D'Annunzio forces carried out several raids today along the coast of the Gulf of Quarnero.

ENJOYABLE CONCERT IN BAPTIST CHURCH

Splendid Programme Excellently Rendered. Cantata the Everlasting Light, Sung by the Church Choir.

One of the reassuring and highly gratifying signs of these times in Charlottetown was the revival of the practice of choral music of excellent quality. That it is very welcome to a music loving community was made evident last evening in the Prince Street Baptist Church, crowded to overflowing to hear the music rendered by the choir of the church in the Christmas Cantata, "The Everlasting Light." Under the musical direction of Professor W. E. Fletcher, and supported by the sympathetic accompaniment of Miss Lillian Earle the choir gave a very fine interpretation of the piece. The parts were, well balanced and severely effective and altogether, the harmony was excellent. Particularly effective were the Soprano and Alto solos by Mrs. Freeman and Mrs. Henderson, with their accompaniment the male quartette by Messrs Fellows, Quigley, Dingwell and Yeo, and the final chorus, "Alleluia." The duets by Miss B. Boyver and Mrs. S. H. Henderson, "Break Forth Into Joy" and by Mrs. Leigh Dingwell and Roy D. Quigley, "Room in My Heart for Thee" were exceedingly well sung, as also the tenor solo by Mr. Fellows and the bass solo by Mr. Pogsom.

OFFICIAL OPENING OF TECHNICAL SCHOOL

The official opening of the new Technical School in the former Government House property took place last evening. About 100 persons were in attendance, about half of these being pupils of the school. Principal Vernon Crockett, Presided and gave an interesting outline of how the school is conducted. The work was started at 8.30 a. m. and continued until 4 p. m. and the school was open for study and recreation every night from 7.30 to 9.30. The students, he stated were as a body of young men as it was possible to get together. He referred to the staff and their duties—and said all had had considerable training. He announced the staff as consisting of the following: Instructor in Animal Husbandry—Wm. Reid, B. S. A., (Ontario Agricultural College.) Field Husbandry—A. F. Hansuld, B.S.A. (Ontario Agricultural College.) Farm Carpenter and Engineer—J. R. Waugh. Motor Mechanics—Henry Whitlock. Wireles—Capt. K. S. Rogers. Arithmetic, English and Commercial subjects—Vernon Crockett. Dairying—F. T. Morrow. The day class has a membership of 30 and the night class of 62. After some further remarks the speaker called upon His Honor, Lieutenant Governor McKinnon who expressed great pleasure at being present. He declared that he did not think a more necessary institution could be started or one with a greater field of opportunity. He stated that when he was a member of the late Government they had made the strongest possible effort to start something along this line but owing to prevailing difficulties they were not successful in getting it on a footing. It was a difficult matter he declared to start an institution of this kind and he hoped and believed the present one would be a success. His Honor after some encouraging remarks to the pupils and staff formally declared the school open. Premier Bell followed and delivered a characteristic address in the course of which he heartily congratulated Hon. Mr. Lea, Commissioner of Agriculture upon the establishment of the school which must be very dear to his heart after all his difficulties. He also felt like congratulating the Federal Government and its representative Prof. Gill, who was present. Prof. Gill spoke next and stated that it gave him great pleasure to be present; first because he was a native of P. E. Island and he believed the instruction to be given at the school would be of a most valuable nature to the Province and also because he himself played some small part leading up to the establishment of the school here. Sinn Fein Plots Discovered

(Special to the Guardian.) LONDON, Dec. 3.—Keen search by Scotland Yard operatives to uncover Sinn Fein machinations are said to be having results. It is declared that many documents have been discovered which disclose a complete list of members of the Irish Self Determination League, also, clues, of the whereabouts of men and women desired by the authorities. Clues in the hands of Scotland Yard authorities are being followed closely.

Premier Sends Note to Greeks

(Special to the Guardian.) LONDON, Dec. 3.—The Allied Premier's Conference today agreed to send a note to the Greek Government declaring the restoration of Constantinople to the throne of Greece would be regarded as a ratification by that country of Constantine's hostile acts and would create a new and unfavorable situation in relations between Greece and the Allies.

British Pay Loan

LONDON, Dec. 3.—Austin Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer announced in the Commons today that the British share of Angle-French loan from the United States was repaid on date, due at a cost to Exchequer of £59,229,000.

Liquor Carriage Delaying Trains

(Special to the Guardian.) OTTAWA, Dec. 3.—The question as to whether there would be any objection to doubling the tariff on liquor by express was suggested by Hon. F. B. Carvell, Chairman of the Dominion Railway Board, at the continued hearing today of the application by the Express companies for an increase of 15 per cent in rates. He declared he had travelled around the country and one thing that impressed him was that passenger trains were often late and missing their connections and people not getting the service for which they were paying, due to liquor shipments causing delays.

Countess Tried

(Special to the Guardian.) DUBLIN, Dec. 3.—At the royal barracks today Countess Georgian Markievicz, member of Parliament for St. Patrick's Division, Dublin, City, who was arrested two months ago was tried by Court Martial on the charge of conspiring in 1918 and September, 1920 to organize a Flanna Eireann, otherwise known as Sinn Fein boy scouts. This organization has been charged with conspiracy to murder military police with unlawful drilling, carrying arms, furnishing recruits for Irish volunteers, and generally promoting dissatisfaction.

Fish and Game Ass'n Quarterly Meeting

The Fish and Game Association held their quarterly meeting in the Board of Trade rooms last night with the President, Mr. James Paton, in the chair. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and adopted. Secretary Duck stated that since the last meeting about 244 circulars had been sent out to prospective members, and replies were coming in very favorably. The Association is taking strong measures to protect the Game Laws. Since April over fifty convictions have been made, and more will certainly follow.

Little Change In Election Returns

VANCOUVER, Dec. 3.—There have been few election "changes" during the day and last night the standing of parties as a result of yesterday's voting stands. Liberals, 24. Conservatives, 15. Labor 3. Independents, 4. All in doubtful.
