Turks Defeated On Sinai Peninsula

(Canadian Press Dispatch) (LONDON, Sept. 18)—Defeat of the Turks in a minor engagement on the Sinai Peninsula, 65 miles east of the Suez Canal, was announced officially today as follows:— A mobile column composed of Anzac mounted troops and a camel corps, with some artillery left Bur. El-Abe, on September sixth, with a view to carrying out reconnaissance or other operations west of El-Arish. The column reached an enemy position at El-Mazar, 65 miles from the Canal at dawn on Sunday. A sharp engagement followed in which our troops penetrated the enemy trenches at several points and inflicted considerable casualties, while our artillery heavily shelled the enemy camps. The attack appears to have been a surprise to the Turks and our aircraft saw and fired on several parties of them, among whom were German officers siding rapidly. We took some prisoners. Our casualties were slight.

(Athens Sept. 16— (Midnight)— Via London, Sept. 18— 5:05 a.m. (Delayed)— Nikolaos Kalogeropoulos, the new Premier, made the following declaration today: "The new ministry will follow a benevolent, very benevolent, neutrality toward the Entente, it will decide its attitude in many respects after examination of the situation and studying the diplomatic documents." Premier Kalogeropoulos indignantly repudiated any suggestion that he is pro-German in his sympathies. The cabinet was sworn at noon.
